THE WORTH OF COMMON SOIL.
While it is entirely proper for parents to hold before their children the "room at the top" idea as affecting the life pursuits they are to follow, it is sensible to lay stress also on both the worth and dignity of the service of those who do the commoner though just as necessary work of life—who till the soil, lay sewers and water mains, hew wood and dig coal, provide shelter, food and clothing and make the thousand and one other articles that add to the comfort and satisfaction of living. These toilers may wear rougher clothing and get more dirt and calouses on their hands, but the service they render to their fellows is as noble as that of preacher, teacher or professional man.



Brush land or wood soil is ideal for growing potatoes. This is due to the mellowness of the soil resulting from the large amount of humus it contains and the usual freedom of the soil from weed seeds. Where new land is not available much the same condition can be had on a piece of newly plowed pasture or on a clover meadow the last crop of which has been turned under the preceding fall. In both of these cases there will be a good supply of humus and few weeds.

A law of nature as irrevocable as that of the Medes and Persians ordains that a certain class of landlords and tenants—the kind who skin the land and put nothing back—will have to repent and turn from their evil ways or go into involuntary bankruptcy. Stated in another way, it means that this class of chaps have got to quit insulting land worth from \$100 to \$250 an acre with methods that for awhile were considered permissible on virgin land worth from \$15 to \$30 an acre.

They are getting on to the ropes down in German South Africa, having recently ordered 3,000 bushels of pedigree seed corn from the agronomy department of the University of Wisconsin. Experiments in corn growing have been conducted in the territory mentioned and have been attended with such good results that corn culture is to be taken up on a more extensive scale. The season in South Africa is the reverse of that in the north temperate zone, corn being planted on the 1st of October instead of the 1st of May.

The Kansas City Star, owned and published by William R. Nelson, has put up \$500 in cash prizes, which is to be distributed to the boys of Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma who raise next year the best ears of corn as well as the most perfect specimens of single ears and groups of ears. Already the boys in the states mentioned are beginning to plan for the contest, which not only gives promise of being a splendid means of arousing the interest and occupying the energy of the boys, but of having a very tangible result along the line of a production of more and better corn.

It is seldom that profit or benefit comes through getting two bad things together, but there seems to be an exception in the case of using convict labor on the bad roads of the country. In several states where the system has been or is being tried a twofold result has been noticed—roads have been improved at a minimum cost, while the men performing the work under the supervision of proper authority have, through the wholesome influence of exercise, sunshine and fresh air, taken a decided step ahead toward better citizenship. Every state has its bad men and its bad roads. The two should be got together.

Hardly a community but has two types of citizens—the one deserving and receiving the contempt of all fair minded people, the other meriting the greatest respect. The types referred to are respectively those who will not and those who try to pay their honest debts. Instances are frequent in which folks of the former class have money aplenty to spend for most anything under the sun, but nary a cent to pay on an obligation. Those of the other class, who take a reasonable attitude toward their debts, will often deny themselves and go short on things they actually need to meet obligations when they become due. In the same measure that the class first named is deserving of censure the latter is worthy of respect and encouragement in every way.

DEATH OF PIONEER HOP BUYER IN ARIZONA TOWN
Ed C. Herren, formerly of Salem, Succumbs to Falling Health in Tucson, Recently.

Word has been received from Tucson, Arizona, of the death of Ed C. Herren, of Woodburn, a pioneer hopdealer of this state. Mr. Herren had been in failing health for several months and recently went to Arizona in the hope the change would benefit him.

Mr. Herren was born in Salem, April 27, 1861. On reaching manhood he went to Eastern Oregon and engaged in mercantile business at Lone Rock. Returning to Salem in 1887, he became a hopdealer and the firm of Herren & Levy was well known for a number of years.

He married Miss Elizabeth Holman of Salem, April 4, 1898. His wife and five-year-old daughter were with him when he died. Mr. Herren is also survived by three brothers, who are George Herren, a commission merchant of this city; Willard H. Herren, of Heppner, and Albert Herren, of Salem. An older brother, David, died at Spray, Or., last July.

Mr. Herren was an Elk and a Woodman of the World. The Elks had charge of the funeral, which was held at Salem Monday afternoon.

TRIAL GARDENS ESTABLISHED
State and Government Cooperate in Experimental Work.
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Feb. 27.—In cooperation with the government Bureau of Plant Industry the division of horticulture at the Oregon Agricultural college has established trial gardens where experiments to determine the adaptability and value of many varieties of trees and plants will be carried on. A large consignment of valuable trees and plants has just been received, among them 95 different varieties of grapes imported from Europe, which will be rooted and later distributed to the experimental substations in different parts of the state. There are also apple, pear, shade and ornamental trees from various sections of Europe, Asia and China.

A valuable collection of walnut scions will arrive in a few days, and when they come into bearing the college will have the finest collection of walnuts in the world. Several acres will be given over to this work. The walnut collection will be worked into California black walnut roots which the college has been growing for some time past.

SALE LIST OF BLOODED HORSES
Planned For Benefit of Breeders in Oregon.
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Feb. 27.—Professor E. L. Potter, of the animal husbandry department of the Oregon Agricultural college, in his capacity as secretary of the State Stallion Registration board, has issued to all owners of stallions or jacks in the state a letter in which he offers to keep on file in the office of the board a list of all such animals as are for sale, provided that they are properly registered.

The purpose of the board in establishing this list of registered animals for sale is to encourage still further the raising of well-bred horses. From time to time in the past there have been inquiries as to a place to purchase by men interested in breeding good animals. Already the board has a list of considerable size from which prospective purchasers may choose. The service to both buyer and seller is entirely without fee.

The Weston Mutual Improvement club has been organized with 50 members in sight. A full supply of gymnasium apparatus will be installed, and a reading room and a smoking room will be furnished.

Annual Telephone Meeting.
President G. W. McBee has called a meeting of the Liberty Mutual Telephone company to be held at the Liberty school house Monday night, March 4, for the purpose of holding the annual election of officers and for the transaction of other business that needs attention.

The Sunday editions of the Oregonian and the Journal of Portland, contained the picture of Miss Zeta Marie Hollister, a talented young music student who was formerly a resident of Dallas. Miss Hollister is a student of Mrs. Courson Reed and will sing a solo at a recital to be given at the Heilig theater next Thursday.

Coquille Sentinel: One of the largest pigs ever butchered in Coos county was raised by W. M. Rober at the slaughter house at Cunningham. The pig was just eight months and five days old and weighed 410 pounds. Dressed it would have brought nine cents a pound, or \$42.75. It yielded 220 pounds of lard.
