

MANY ATTEND LECTURE

Talks on Loganberries and Prunes
By Leading Growers of State Prove
Valuable to All.

One of the most popular fruit meetings ever given in this city by the Dallas Fruit Growers' association was held Saturday afternoon in the Court House, when nearly every seat was occupied by a practical fruit grower interested in learning more about the two subjects of most importance to the local horticulturist.

Britt Aspinwall, the loganberry king of Oregon, who, with his brother will manage 50 acres of the berries this year, gave a most valuable talk on loganberries and their culture from the standpoint of the man who wishes to make money out of them. His remarks were clear, directly to the point and were extremely well worth listening to.

A. M. Lafollette, one of Marion county's most prominent and substantial citizens who probably knows more about peach growing than any other man in the state, was present and was earnestly invited to talk, but he declined. He has a peach orchard of 25 acres at this time, and has been growing them for 30 years on the Willamette river bottom 10 miles north of Salem.

NATIVE DAUGHTER IS CALLED

Mrs. Edward Koub, of Ballston, Dead, After Long Illness.

Mrs. Cassie May Koub, wife of Edward Koub, died at her home at Ballston, on Saturday March 2, after an illness of four months duration. Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist Episcopal church in Ballston, Sunday afternoon, March 3, by Rev. J. M. Hixson.

Cassie May McDaniel was born at Independence, Ore., May 26, 1888. She was married to Edward Koub, of Ballston, on Nov. 8, 1906, and was therefore aged 24 years, nine months and five days. She leaves her husband and two children, one a girl of three years and the other an infant daughter of five months. She is also survived by her mother, sister and brother.

The Ballston church was filled with friends and neighbors of the deceased, who came to pay their respects to all that was mortal of the little wife and mother. Interment took place in Pleasant Hill cemetery, three miles from Ballston. The bereaved family has the sympathy of all in their affliction.

Dies at Hospital.

Mark Dashiell died at a local hospital Friday, March 1, of tuberculosis of the bone, after a protracted illness. Funeral services were conducted at R. L. Chapman's mortuary parlors on Saturday by Rev. J. F. Miles, interment taking place in Dallas cemetery. Deceased was unmarried and leaves a sister in Iowa and a brother in Oklahoma who have been notified of his death. Dashiell had been in the employ of Joseph Goetz, living north of the city, for a year or more, and a few weeks ago received an injury which caused an abscess to form. He was operated on in the hope of saving his life but he gradually grew worse until the end.
