A TRAINLOAD OF STEERS FREEZE.

An incident of the period of severe cold in January, which reached a climax in a temperature of from 35 to 42 degrees below zero through the northern tier of states, that will probably not be recorded again in a generation, was the freezing to death of eighteen carloads of fat steers that were snowbound for fifty-six hours on the C. R. I. and P. railway between Neola and Council Bluffs. It is said that as the animals began to freeze they remained standing, and when the discovery of their plight was made the entire trainload, totalling some 300 head, were stark and stiff and still on their feet. If the steers were worth \$70 a head the damages that will have to be paid by the railroad will be \$25,200.

BURNING STUMPS.

The following method is recommended for treating stumps prior to burning them: Bore a hole in the center of each stump to a depth of a foot with a two inch augur, fill the hole one-fourth full of powdered saltpeter and the remainder with coal oil, filling a second time with coal oil when the oil first applied is absorbed. This job should be done in the spring, and in the fall it is said the stumps will burn, roots and all. Under this method it is claimed that the saltpeter dries the sap, while the oil penetrates the wood thoroughly and tends to make the combustion complete.

GETTING AFTER TREE BORERS

Members of Oregon Agricultural League to Fight Pests. Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., March 5.—The peach and prune tree borer is the object of much interest in experiments now being conducted by members of the Oregon Agricultural Experiment League, of which W. B. Dickerson of Hood River is president.

Methods of control other than that of digging out the borers are being tried. For the experiment five blocks of trees are marked out. The first is sprayed with lime-sulphur and arsenate of lead combined in the usual manner, but care is taken to spray the trunks thoroughly.

On the second block a special application of the spray is made to the trunks and bases of the trees, using two pounds of Paris Green to fifty gallons of the lime-sulphur diluted with water. This application is made during July. On block three the same application is made, using arsenate of lead in the proportion of five pounds to fifty gallons of the spray.

The fourth block of trees receives a thorough application of stiff white-wash to the trunk and base of each tree, with about three pounds of Paris Green added to each barrel of the white-wash. The dirt should be removed from the base of the tree before the white-wash is applied, and when a puddle of the wash has formed around the tree, the dirt should be well mounded about the tree. The white-washing should be done in July. The fifth block of trees is left as a check, and the following season all sprayed and unsprayed trees should be examined, to find the comparative results of the treatment.

GIVES VENTILATION. The use of muslin in place of window sash is now an accepted practice with practically all up to date poultry keepers. Not only does the muslin admit sufficient light, but what is more essential than this, makes possible a perfect circulation of air. This insures the health of the flock, which in turn is a prime condition for egg production. A lady reader of these notes who has her poultry houses equipped in the above fashion reports twenty-six eggs from her flock of less than a hundred hens on a day recently when her thermometer on the back porch registered 36 below zero. Muslin is cheaper than window glass and is also better for the birds. Another who has tried muslin in place of the upper window sash reports that dampness on the floor has disappeared since the change was made.

POTASH FROM SEAWEED. Investigations which have been made by the department of agriculture with a view to finding practical sources for the securing of commercial potassium seem to have demonstrated that an ample supply of this valuable fertilizing element is to be got from the beds of kelp or giant seaweed which are found over considerable areas along the Pacific coast shore line. This weed extracts the potassium salts from the sea water, and when the weeds are dried the potassium exudes to the surface in the shape of potassium chloride. The dried plants contain from 25 to 30 per cent of the chloride, and it is estimated that if properly handled these beds would produce annually for an indefinite period of time 1,000,000 tons of potassium chloride, worth \$40,000,000.

The simple minded congressman still seems to be pinning faith to the annual distribution of seeds to his individual constituents. To make this farce possible the department of agriculture is now asking for bids for the furnishing of 200,000 pounds of vegetable seeds and 50,000 pounds of flower seeds.

Excursion to San Francisco to Select Site For Oregon Building Proves Popular; Two Trains Necessary.

Portland, March 5.—Response to the call of the Oregon Development League for a large representation from Oregon, on the choosing the site for its building at the Panama Pacific International exposition at San Francisco in 1915, has been so great that it will probably be necessary for more than one special train to carry the delegation.

The day set apart is March 14, and trains will leave Portland on the afternoon of March 12. Word has been received from such extreme points as Lakeview, Prineville, Burns, Baker, Klamath Falls, and Astoria, that they will be represented by delegations. Eugene is planning to send a banner delegation of fifty or more; this will be the largest outside of Portland. Two hundred members of the Portland Commercial club will make the trip. As the most of the delegates will be accompanied by their ladies, the occasion will be of considerable social significance. The fare from Portland will be \$25 for the round trip.

Oregon has been conceded the unusual honor, even over California itself, of the first choice of site. The invitation that has been extended by the fair officials and the commercial bodies of San Francisco indicates that the entertainment they will provide will be of a most elaborate nature.

At the headquarters of the Oregon Development League messages have been received from the commercial bodies all over the state. This indicates that they will act in harmony with the slogan of the league, that the Panama-Pacific International exposition marks the climax of present exploitation work on the Pacific coast.

FEW FAIL IN THEIR STUDIES. The "Con Squad" at O. A. C. of First Semester is Small.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., March 5.—Registrar H. M. Tennant of the O. A. C. has reported but a few failures among the students for the first semester, and most of those were men. Out of a student body of 1280 but 13 were dropped for studies averaging below 60, 10 of whom were men; and of the 33 put on probation, 28 were men. These latter will be required to maintain a high average in all their studies, reporting weekly their progress, and will be dismissed from college if they fail to improve in their work.

CHEAP RATES ARE ANNOUNCED. Railroads Name Low Rates For Pacific Coast Events.

Excursion rates for the summer festivals and national conventions to be held on the Pacific coast during 1912 have been fixed at one and one-third fares and liberal stop-over privileges will be granted. Events provided for are: Mystic Shriners at Los Angeles in May, Rose Festival at Portland in June, the Elks at Portland in July, the Golden Potlatch at Seattle in July and the Montanara Fests at Tacoma.

Eugene Guard: Ten miles of street paving is needed in Eugene just as quickly as it can be laid. If the city votes to pave the intersections there will be no doubt that this work will be commenced within a few weeks and continued for a year or more.

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
