district No. 1, who had voted a special tax of eight mills for road purposes, were present to protest against the construction of an eight foot road in their district. This action was taken in accordance with a mass meeting held in the district on March 1, called to protest against the building of the eight foot road and which meeting passed resolutions favoring the wider highway and asking that Road Supervisor W. F. Schaad be entrusted with the work.

Inasmuch as the taxpayers of that district had voted the special tax, it was shown that they would have the privilege of deciding just what sort of a road they wanted. It was further decided that the work would not be done under contract but that the county would build it under the supervision of Supervisor Schaad.
