MAY MAKE CHAIRS HERE SUCCESS IS ASSURED

Automatic Chair Company Incorporates With \$75,000 Capital. Local Man Interested.

With a capitalization of \$75,000 the Automatic Opera Chair company was incorporated last week with E. H. Smith and Karl Slesse, of Portland, and Charles W. Minnich, of Dallas, as incorporators. The principal place of business is Dallas, and the object of the company is to manufacture the automatic chairs for which Mr. Smith holds a patent. According to Mr. Minnich an effort will at once be made to dispose of stock in the concern, and if successful, a factory will be erected here.

The chair is so arranged that it will close automatically immediately one arises. The benefit of such an arrangement may readily be understood by all who have visited a theater and attempted to pass out through a long row of opera chairs, about half of which were unfolded. Many panics and great loss of life have resulted from the fact that opera chairs remained open, thus preventing the rapid egress of the audience to the aisles. One or two theaters have already been equipped with the chairs, and experiments have demonstrated that the audience may pass out rapidly and without confusion. The patentee of the chair and his associates point out that, once the chair is adopted by a theater in any city, popular demand will require that they be generally adopted.

E. H. Smith, the patentee of the chair, is also the inventor of the Adjustable Electric Socket which company is endeavoring to arrange to erect a factory for manufacturing here.

MAY USE OIL ON STREETS TO ALLAY DUST EVIL

City Council Has New Plan Under Consideration; Believe Oil Cheaper Than Water.

The question of the substitution of crude oil, or "tarvie" for street dressing to do away with the dust nuisance, has been seriously considered by the city council and is now being investigated. It is believed that, with a dressing of the "tarvie" on the principal business streets, the necessity of sprinkling may be eliminated and the dust effectually laid for the entire season. Other municipalities that have experimented with the material generally report very flattering success. Although the figures have not been verified, it is said that the total cost for the year of a dressing of this kind, compared with street sprinkling during the dry months, will show a saving in favor of the former. It is possible that some of the common dirt streets of the city may be sprinkled with crude oil and thus do away with the dust nuisance in the residence districts which, during the very dry months, grows very annoying.
