SITE IS SELECTED FOR HOSPITAL

CORNER SHELTON AND COURT
STREETS SELECTED.

Many Possible Locations Investigated
But Favorite Corner Combines All
Advantages Is Declaration.

The new Dallas hospital which is to be built by the recently organized Dallas Hospital association, will be located on a site at the corner of Shelton and Court streets known as the "onkey property." Decision to this effect was made at the meeting of the directors held at the offices of Oscar Hayter in the Uglow building Saturday night. It was also decided to call for a payment of 25 per cent on the capital stock subscribed by local citizens. The price paid for the property was \$800 and is considered a very reasonable figure. The committee appointed to view the different available sites reported and, after a consideration of all of them, the Conkey property was decided upon.

Brown Site Too Small.
"After a careful consideration of all the sites offered," said a member of the board of directors, "we felt that the site selected offered more advantages than any of the others. Every member of the directors felt grateful to Mr. Brown for his generous offer of the site on Robb street and it would undoubtedly have been accepted had the lot been larger. On the site selected we have plenty of ground, it is close in, and near to the business center, which was another consideration in its favor. All things considered, we believe that we have chosen the best location for the new hospital and we will now proceed to the details which must be arranged before the actual construction of the building is possible. We will rush matters rapidly in order to have the new building ready for use at the earliest possible moment."

MRS. A. BURGE ANSWERS CALL Dies at Family Residence East of Dallas; Buried at Turner.

Mrs. Austria Burge died at her home three miles east of Dallas on Sunday morning, April 7, of dropsy and a complication of diseases, after a lingering illness, aged 52 years, three months and 15 days. The remains were shipped by Undertaker Chapman to Turner, Monday morning, where funeral services were held and where interment took place. Deceased leaves a husband, four sisters and three brothers.

READY FOR STREET CONTRACT

Gasoline Tractor Arrives; Brakes Strengthened to Bear Weight.

Ralph Adams' big 60-horsepower gasoline tractor arrived from Portland Saturday night and will be placed in commission at once. His dump wagons have not yet arrived, but are expected soon and he plans to have everything ready to begin work on his street contract as soon as the streets have been graded and placed in condition for the rock.

Several extra bents have been placed under the west bridge over LaCree creek in order to sustain the weight of the big engine and its heavy trailers of crushed rock wagons. Mr. Adams has his smaller engine still, but may dispose of it during the summer.

Last of the Maine Victims Are Buried In Arlington

THE last scenes in the tragedy of the Maine were enacted in the sinking of her bulk with military honors at sea and the burial at Arlington a few days later of the thirty-four bodies which had remained with her at the bottom of Havana harbor for fourteen years. Ten thousand people attended the memorial services held in front of the state, war and navy building in Washington, and thousands were present at the graves in the national cemetery. The president and the members of the cabinet, the speaker of the house, senators and representatives, as well as the high officials of the navy and army, gathered to pay their last tribute to the first martyrs of the Spanish war. Father John P. Chidwick, chaplain of the ship at the time of the explosion, had a prominent part in the exercises of the day, delivering the memorial address. The coffins were borne on gun carriages draped with the flag and were buried in that part of the great cemetery in which were laid the bodies of the Maine victims recovered immediately after the disaster.

to keep tabs on all speeders, both autoists and motorcyclists, and arrest all who are found exceeding the speed limit of 15 miles per hour.

The estimated cost of the proposed street improvements was placed at 40 cents per foot for the curbs and \$2.00 for the macadam.

Ralph Adams' proposal to roll the surface of street at sub-grade for 7 1/2 cents per cubic yard, was referred to the street committee to investigate and report.

The fire and water committee was instructed to investigate a request for an arc light at the intersection of Jefferson and Clay streets.

Councilman Cosper reported that he had conferred with owner of abutting property at the rock quarry with reference to sluicing away the earth over the rock deposit and had gained the consent for such operations, provided the work was done when the water in the creek was at sufficient stage to insure no damage to the stream.

The purchase, by Fire Chief A. P. Risser, of cut-off nozzles and smoke protectors for the use of the fire department, was approved.

Hurt by Fall.
J. C. Morrison, foreman for Horst Bros., met with a painful accident in the barn at the Horst farm last week, when he fell from the loft, striking on his back on one of the mangers below. He was taken to his home in Salem, where his injuries were attended to. Sunday H. G. Campbell and J. W. Crider motored over to Salem and called on Mr. Morrison and found him improving.
