Mr. Magee is doing carpenter work for Mr. Landen.

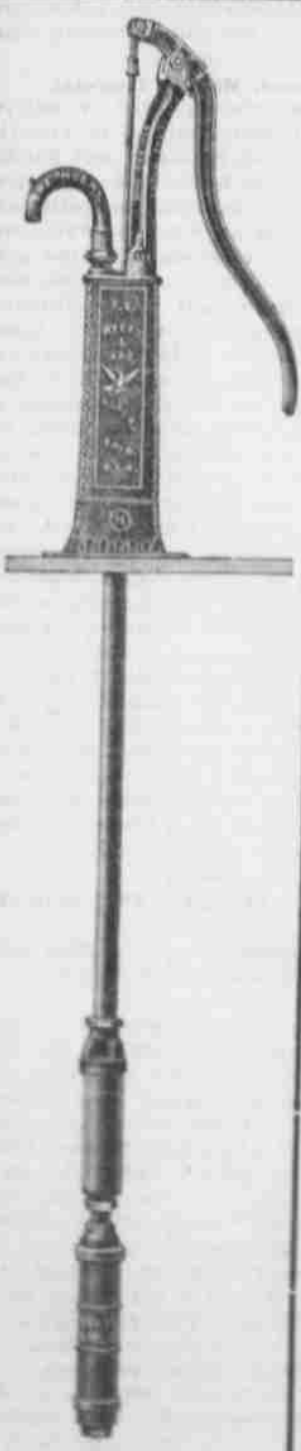
