Dahlia Culture.

To begin with, choose good, sound tubers, cut from the main bunch in such a way as to include enough of the stalk to insure one or more buds to sprout. No tuber will grow, however sound, if the stem by which it is attached to the main mass of roots is broken or cut. The one most sure to grow is that attached directly to the flower stalk of the previous season's growth and planted, stalk and all. Plant from three to five inches deep, according to the size and number of tubers. The larger ones to be planted the deeper. Plant about 30 inches apart in the rows and make the rows about four feet apart. Tastes differ as to planting. I am telling you what I have found the most satisfactory plan for myself.

They will grow the best in open ground, away from fences and shrubbery, where they have the sun all day. Unless the soil is quite poor do not enrich it when they are planted, as it will stimulate a large plant growth at the expense of the flowers. That is where a good many make a mistake, I think. Wait until the plants begin to show buds, then work in a good top dressing of rotted manure, and it will stimulate the blossoms instead of the plant. There is no use to try to raise dahlias unless one expects to give them plenty of water all summer long. Dahlias love sunshine and water and will not thrive unless they have an abundance of both. Given this attention they will grow in most any soil.

Thin the show varieties to one or two stalks when they are four or five inches high. Pinch the top of the stalk out. Thin from three to five stalks in the cactus and decorative varieties. I do not top these at all. The quill, collarette pompon and century varieties I treat as the show dahlias. The pompon should be about six inches high when topped.

They should all be tied firmly to strong stakes set firmly in the ground to keep the summer breezes from breaking them with their heavy load of flowers.

Following is a list of my favorites in each class as far as my experience goes: In fancy varieties there is nothing finer than the old American banner. Although introduced 20 years ago, it is still a favorite, like the Safrano among the roses. It is variegated, the same plant having red, pink and white blossoms at the same time with others, combined in a rich confusion.

Among the best of the new type might be mentioned Snow White, Emily, Lavender, Client, Dark Red, Virginia, Mauve Pink and Magnificent Yellow.

Of the decorative type the Jennie Charnel is one of the finest; color red, deepening to pink. There is no dahlia of this class that I like better than the Dr. G. Sonzon. It is the largest dahlia of all and is beautifully formed. Clifford W. Brunton and Mrs. Winters are also very fine, as well as many others.

Of the cactus dahlias, are artemis-like is one of the best, winsome, aegir, Minnie West and many others are also very fine.

President Vlger is the best of the collarette type.

Snowclad is perhaps the best of the pompons.

Grand Duke Alexis, white, and A. D. Gavoni, pink, are lovely ones of the quilled type. Among the Clematis flowered the Twentieth Century is one of the best. Queen Williamina is one of the finest peony flowered dahlias.

Dahlias should be planted where the soil is well drained. They commence to flower earlier and the tubers keep better.

I give my dahlia beds a thorough hoeing at least four times during a season.

The Richest Man In Mexico And His Granddaughters

THE richest man in Mexico, General Luis Terrazas, typifies conditions which caused the Madero revolution and underlie the present rebellion. He and members of his family own the greater part of the state of Chihuahua, the business and politics of which they have controlled for more than fifty years. Terrazas was one of the lieutenants of Diaz and was rewarded for driving the French out of his state by the gift of the governorship under the dictator. He used his opportunities so well that he amassed a fortune of (some say) \$150,000,000 gold. He owns 15,000,000 acres of land, which the rebels—like the Madero revolutionists before them—want to see confiscated or sold on terms that will give the common people a chance to have farms of their own instead of existing merely as peons or laborers. Enrique C. Creel, former governor of Chihuahua and at one time ambassador to the United States, himself a very wealthy man, is a son-in-law of Terrazas. The photograph here reproduced is of the general, now more than eighty years old, and his granddaughters, Senoritas Urneta (seated) and Laghet (standing).
