Quite a number from the country came in Tuesday to hear LaFollette speak. The Monmouth band and the Ladies' Normal glee club furnished the music.

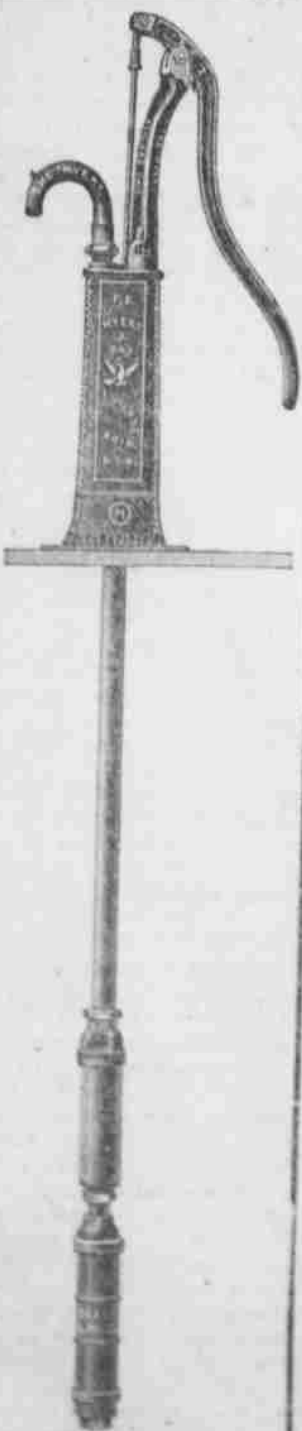
Reve Skinner, of the Luckiamute, had quite a runaway Monday morning in town. His fine team, frightened at the train, ran away, but fortunately did no great damage.

A. N. Poole made a business trip to Portland Tuesday, returning by way of Salem.

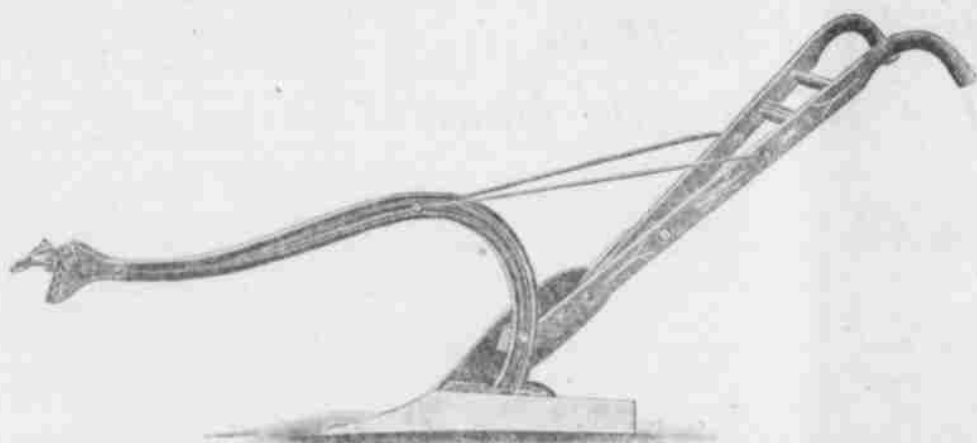
