## DISORDER DRIVES DAVIS DAFFY

FANCIED WRONGS AND DRINK UNSEATS MAN'S REASON.

Secures Revolver and Threatens to Kill Alleged Author of Domestic Troubles; Sent to Asylum.

With his mind unbalanced from constant brooding over his troubles and too frequent imbibition of the flowing bowl, Lewis W. Davis, a resident of the northern part of Polk county, was apprehended in Dallas Saturday and committed to the state asylum, at Salem, following an examination by Drs. McCullon and Starbuck before County Judge Ed. F. Coad.

On Monday, April 29, Davis was served with papers announcing suit begun for divorce from him by his wife, Mattie M. Davis, and the custody of the two children. It is said that Davis immediately began drinking to "drown his troubles" as he admits, and for several days he wandered the streets, refusing to eat or sleep until he became a wreck, physically and mentally. He fancied that certain parties were in league against him determined to separate him from his family and he is said to have threatened to kill them. It is known that he secured a revolver and that he carried it for a few days but when he was apprehended Saturday, the gun was not in his possession. He was regarded by the authorities as a dangerous individual to have at large in his present state and hence his arrest followed.

He was taken to Salem in the asylum auto late Saturday night in company with two attendants.

R. E. Williams was elected as state committeeman and M. Goetz, of South Independence, congressional committeeman. The only vacancy appearing on the committee was from Black Rock and Walter Ray was named to represent that precinct. The general outlook was discussed and encouraging reports were received from all portions of the county.

## NEW COURSE IN DAIRY FARMING

Agricultural College To Begin Work Next Fall.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 6.—A new course in milk production is to be offered by the dairy department of the Oregon agricultural college next fall. Few colleges separate the manufacturing and production features of the dairy instruction, but at the O. A. C. it has been decided to offer two separate courses, so that students may specialize in either branch of the industry they desire, or take both at once.

The new work will take up in detail the care, management, breeding and feeding of dairy cattle to the end of gaining the largest possible milk history of pure-bred dairy cattle.

The college hopes in the near future to be able to establish in connection with this work a dairy demonstration farm of about 50 acres on which the students can gain actual practical experience of the management of a dairy business. It will be made entirely self supporting in time as all of the feed for the cows will be raised on this tract, where they will be bred, grazed and cared for as on any commercial dairy farm.

The equipment of the dairy laboratories has just received the addition of another steam turbine Babcock tester, made necessary by the growth of the department since entering the new building.

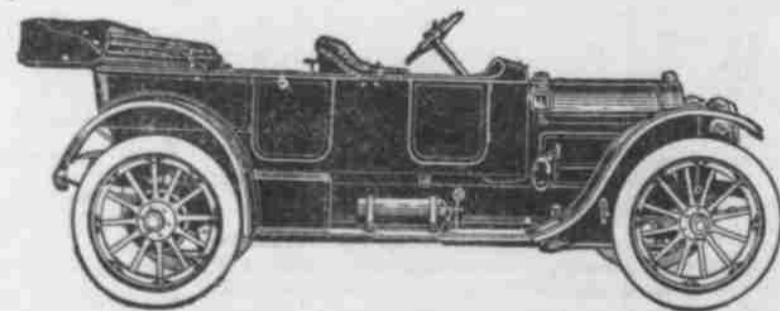
