On all that part of Clay Street lying between the East line of Fair View Avenue and the West line of Oregon Avenue.
That the said improvement shall consist in general of the grading and macadamization of said part of said street above described and designated; and shall be made at the time and in the manner to be hereafter more particularly prescribed by such ordinance.

That the cost of said improvement shall be assessed to the real property fronting and abutting upon said part of said Clay Street above described and designated.

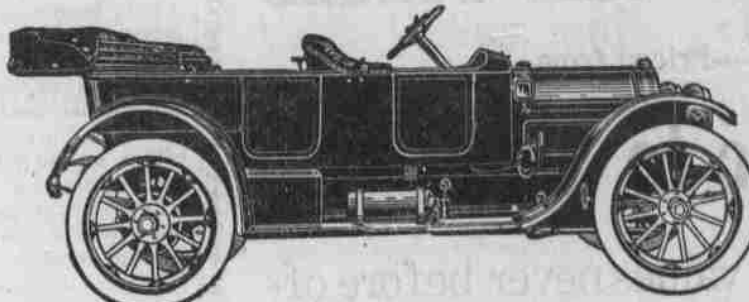
