## Attractive Features Found in National Guard Membership

Capt. Toozie, of Company G, Issues Call For 80 Recruits; Young Men Urged to Join; Annual Encampments and Outings Appeal to Many; Wants Company of Full Strength.

Company G, 3rd Infantry, O. N. G., of Dallas, is in need of a large number of able-bodied recruits. Eighty more men can be handled. The call comes as a result of the recent action of the War Department in enlarging the size of infantry companies. Men are wanted who can and will take an interest in the work, and can and will attend drills and camps of instruction.

"There is more pleasure in drilling, where a large company is in line, than the average person realizes," said Capt. Toozie recently. "It is an ideal training, and one that each male citizen of the country should have. It teaches the use of the rifle; the care of the person; and military evolutions. Drilling itself is a pleasure, when enough men are in line to make a good showing. The target range, with rifles and ammunition furnished, together with targets, and all other necessities, affords a chance for competition and keen sport; besides opening a way for trips to the state rifle competition at Clackamas, and even to the national rifle competition in the East.

**Yearly Outings.**  
"In addition to these things each year the company takes an outing in the way of an encampment. Every other year this encampment is a government encampment, and is made in connection with other Western National Guards, together with the regular army of the Department of the Columbia. Upon these encampments, first enlistment privates receive \$1.25 per day; corporals \$1.40; sergeants \$1.80; first sergeant \$2.00; quartermaster sergeant \$2.00; mess sergeant \$2.00; cooks \$2.00. Second enlistment men receive \$1.25 per day in addition to fees mentioned above; third enlistment men \$ .50 in addition, and so on. Besides this pay the men receive their food and clothing. These encampments are valuable, both from a standpoint of instruction and pleasure. No better way could be found for enjoying an outing, and pay does not entirely stop. In Portland, where are located the

best companies in the state, the companies are made up of clerks, business and professional men, and they plan each year upon these encampments as an outing.

"In addition to the above, there is every assurance at this time, that the military pay bill will pass at the next session of Congress. It has already been reported favorably by the military affairs committee, and this practically means its adoption by Congress. It is one of the best measures yet proposed looking to the maintenance of our military strength. Under this law, enlisted privates will draw about \$1.00 for each drill of an hour's duration.

### Good Facilities Here.

"In Dallas, we have a fine armory, and will soon have a fine military club in connection therewith. This city should support a large and excellent company. More business men are wanted; men who will take an interest in the work. It takes but very little time, and it is a service to a man's country, that each and every patriotic citizen should be glad to render; every male citizen who is able-bodied and between the ages of 18 and 45.

"The encampment this year will be held in Washington. The Oregon National guard will be among the attacking forces that will try to capture Seattle. The start will be made at or about Centralia, and nights will be spent under the pup-tents, meals cooked wherever the regiments may happen to be, and most of the food secured from farmers, etc., along the route. It will be one of the most interesting encampments, besides being the largest ever held in the Pacific Northwest. About 15,000 men will participate. Company G will leave this station the morning of July 29, and will return on July 30, a vacation of 10 days.

"Lieutenant Staffin has been appointed recruiting officer for this company, and all able-bodied men who will take an interest in this work, attend drills, etc., and who care to lend their influence and the value of their connection to this company, will be accepted with pleasure by the above-mentioned officer. It is the desire of the officers in charge of this company to build up a first-class company here; one that will not only be a credit to Dallas, but will also be without a peer in the Third regiment, the pride of Oregon."

### MISFORTUNE MEETS CIRCUS

**Sells-Floto Show Loses Baby Elephant and Several Horses.**  
The baby elephant of the Sells-Floto show, which exhibited in Dallas on May 30, and which proved one of the attractions of the exhibition, died at Pindilton last week of pneumonia. The night previous, while the circus was being transported from The Dalles, a car of horses, next to the engine, caught fire from sparks, and before the blaze was extinguished 22 of the largest draft horses of the show had been cremated. None of the ring animals were in the car, but the loss of the horses and the baby elephant have been a severe blow to the show.

### SHOULD USE GREAT CAUTION.

The farmer living in the northern part of the corn belt, who for one reason or another may have to buy seed corn within the next few weeks, should exercise the greatest caution in the securing of this supply. If possible he should get it from some of his nearest neighbors, as experience in many states has proved that such seed will do better than that brought in from any considerable distance. It may be that a good many ears will have to be tested individually to get the seed one needs, but this will be worth while. If such home grown seed cannot be secured then one must look about in some other quarter for that which is good. There are a few seed men who are reliable and whose statements regarding seed corn they have for sale may be taken at face value. There are others who are in the shyster class, from whom nothing should be bought under any condition. But from whomsoever secured no seed corn

should be bought except in the case on the express guarantee that it is to be paid for unless it will be Shelled bulk seed corn is a risky proposition in an ordinary year and especially so this year, when a good deal of seed is so scarce. An incident showing this was related to the other day. A firm advertising Minnesota grown seed corn for was investigated by customers, and was found that their supply of Minnesota grown seed was secured from a seed house at Sioux Falls, S. D., where it had been shipped from some Nebraska. If this seed had been tallied it would have been all right Nebraska, but it was virtually worthless except for fodder purposes in localities where it was distributed Minnesota grown seed. Had this been bought in the ear this would have been discovered at once.
