CRIDER TO BUILD NEW BLOCK

TWO STORY CONCRETE BUILDING FOR MILL STREET.

Work on Same to Begin in July is Report; To Adjoin Sterling Furniture Co.; Hotel on Upper Floor.

Another modern store building will be added to those already possessed by Dallas during the present summer when J. W. Crider will erect on his lots, adjoining the Sterling Furniture company's building on Mill street, a double concrete structure two stories in height.

The building will be of similar construction as the Hotel Scott building and the upper floors will be finished for hotel purposes and its equipment added to the New Scott hotel.

Mr. Crider formerly owned the building now occupied as a cleaning parlor, but the building and lot adjoining it on the east was owned by E. C. Kirkpatrick. A deal was made whereby Mr. Kirkpatrick traded his property for that of Mr. Crider on the west, thus giving the former his property in one continuous line. It is on the property thus secured that the new building will be erected.

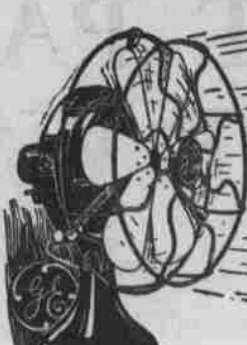

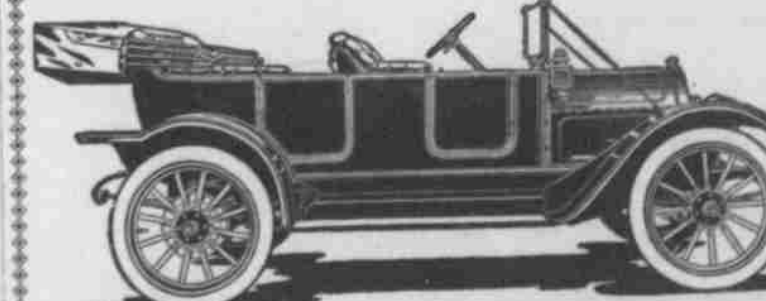
