Company G is hereby commanded to assemble in the Armory, Dallas, Oregon, Thursday evening, June 27, at the hour of 8 p. m. sharp, dressed in full O. D. uniform, with gun and side-arms, for the purpose of quarterly inspection. First call will be at 7:40 p. m. Inspection will be made by Major R. O. Scott, 2nd battalion, 3rd infantry, O. N. G. Absolutely no excuses for absences will be accepted except where absence is out of the county, is detained because of his own sickness or sickness of a member of his family which requires his presence at home, or by reason of work by which he habitually earns his livelihood. All absences will be promptly reported to headquarters by the inspecting officer and action taken accordingly.

### STATE NEWS

The most extensive "Seeing Oregon" trip ever undertaken from Portland will be the big excursion to Lakeview next August. Business men of the metropolis will go by automobiles, covering about 2,000 miles. Alternate routes will be taken going and coming, so that an immense area of the state will be covered. At Lakeview the Central Oregon Development league will be in session August 20, 21 and 22, and the journey will cover ten days. Some will go by train to Bend, others by auto, and all will leave Bend and motor southward to Lakeview, following different routes. Returning the Klamath country and Crater Lake will be visited and delegates from Portland will take the train at Bend for home. Secretary C. C. Chapman, of the Oregon Development league, is making plans for the trip and those who go will have a better knowledge of interior Oregon than ever before.

Good prizes will be offered and it is expected to make the affair a big success. It will be under the general direction of the State Horticultural society and business interests and commercial bodies will cooperate fully.

The first great dairy show ever held west of the Rocky mountains is scheduled for Portland November 18, 25. It is offered by prominent dairymen and livestock growers of the West, with an advisory committee representing many Eastern states as well. From present indications, there will be the greatest display of dairy stock, dairy products and dairy machinery ever assembled on the Pacific slope. There will also be a big sale of dairy cattle at the show and the executive committee has adopted the rule that everything offered for

sale must be guaranteed against tuberculosis for three months after the sale.

The state committee has under way an exhibit showing how 75,000 boys and girls of the state have been interested in the new competitive gardening contests and how 10,000 Portland school children were enlisted in similar work in this city alone. The next step, it is expected, will be to make this industrial education an integral part of the state school system.
