quarry in the past.

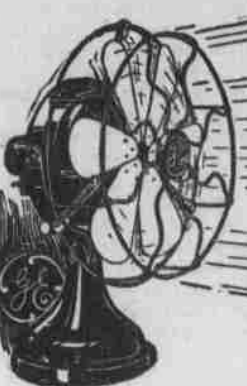

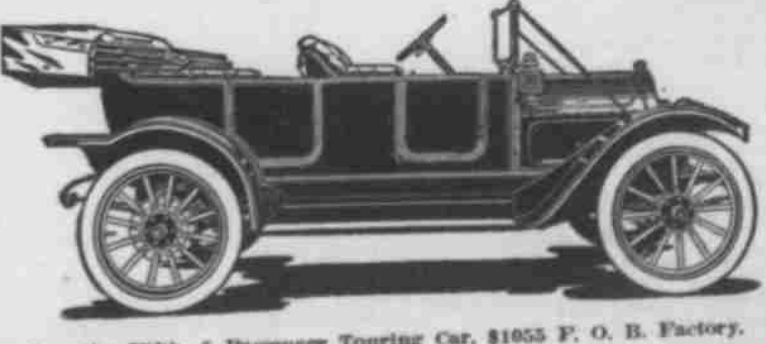
