

Dog Smugglers.

Previous to the year 1795 in the Netherlands dogs were employed in smuggling, which was the more easy as they are exceedingly docile. The dogs were trained to go forward and backward between two places on the frontier without any person to attend them. Being loaded with little parcels of goods, lace, etc., like mules, they set out at midnight and only went when it was perfectly dark. An excellent, quick scented dog always went some paces before the others, stretched out his nose toward all quarters and when he scented custom house officers turned back, which was the signal for immediate flight. Concealed behind bushes or in ditches, the dogs waited till all was safe, then proceeded on their journey and reached at last beyond the frontier the dwelling house of the receiver of the goods, who was in the secret. But here also the leading dog only at first showed himself. At a certain whistle, which was a signal that all was right, they hastened up. They were then unloaded, taken to a convenient stable, where there was a good layer of hay, and well fed. There they rested until midnight and then returned in the same manner over the frontier.—Philadelphia Ledger.
