of the family really believed that he
would do anything rash.

Prepares for End.

Paul remained at the house alone
after Thursday and the only persons
who saw him there were Thurston
and McCready. That he had calmly
prepared for the deed was evidenced
by an investigation of the premises
and the condition of the body. He
had donned a freshly laundered shirt
and a pair of black trousers and wore
a pair of house slippers. He had
gone to the woodshed and calmly
seated himself on the floor had placed
the barrel of the shot gun against
his breast and had evidently sprung
the trigger with a stick of wood
found near the body. In a hip pocket
of the trousers were found two
notes, one directed to Mrs. Paul and
the other to J. J. Thurston. There
were also two pictures of Mrs. Paul
in the pocket. The note to Thurston
gave some directions regarding the
disposal of the body and asked
Thurston to "look out for Mrs. Paul."
Investigation showed that only the
left hand barrel of the gun had been
fired and the full charge of No. 9
shot had entered the body lodging in
the backbone.

The Paul home is one of the most
pretentious in the Saver district. The
house is a modern bungalow and is
well furnished. The outbuildings are
above the average and the entire
farm of 220 acres is among the best
in Southern Polk county. Paul pur-
chased the place several years ago
and has lived there off and on since.
He was formerly a machinery sales-
man and spent much of his time on
the road. He held life insurance
policies in the Commercial Travelers
association and the Woodmen of the
World, aggregating \$5,000.

He was about 60 years.

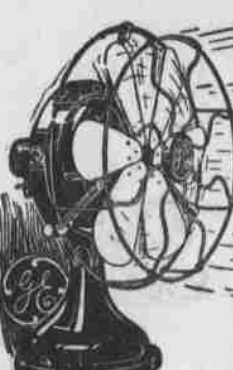

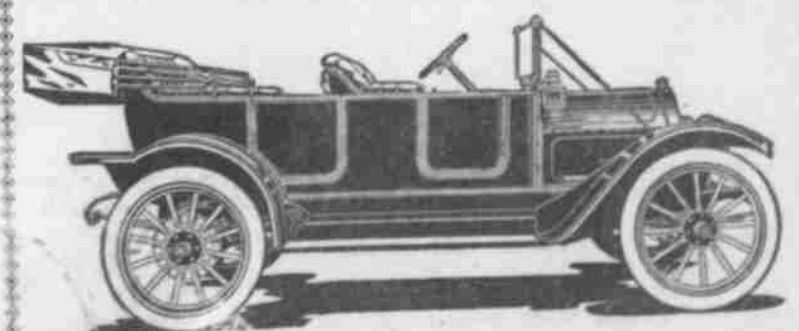
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
