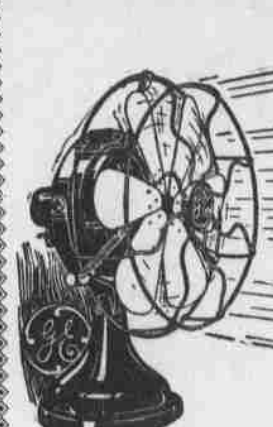

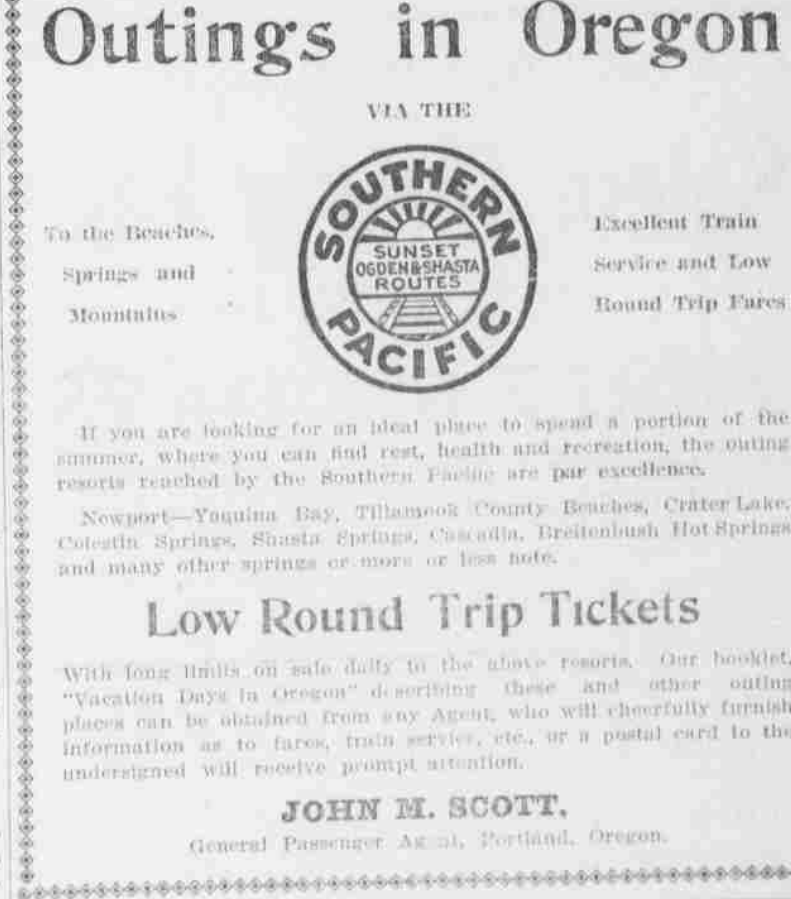

The roots of large trees have so entangled the sewer pipes in Hood River that many of them have been rendered useless and will have to be removed at considerable expense.

Experiments in raising California "big trees" far north of their natural zone are being made by the forestry service in the Tahoe national forest.
