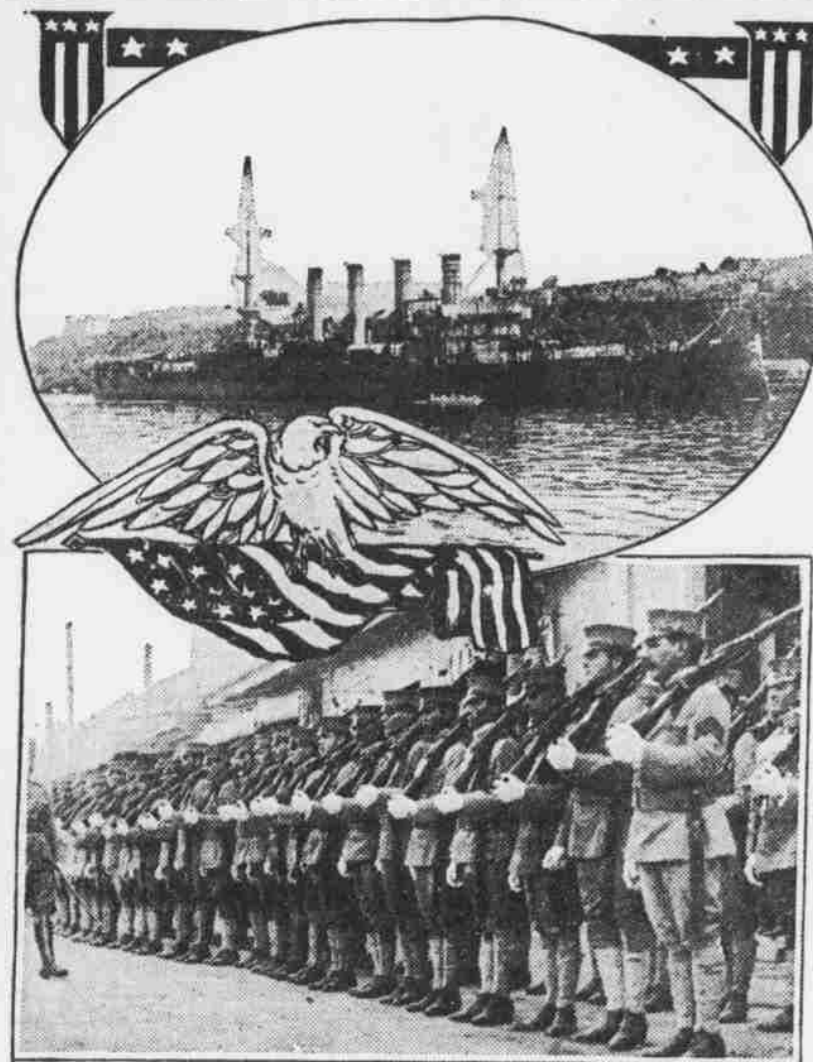


### Cuba's Insurrection and Two Of the Means of Checking It

ONCE again the United States government has been obliged to make preparations to "keep the lid on" in Cuba and has dispatched a strong squadron under the command of Rear Admiral Osterhaus, with the armored cruiser Washington as his flagship, to land marines at Guantanamo and to take such steps as may be necessary to safeguard American interests. Under the provisions of the Platt amendment the United States has "the right to intervene for the preservation of Cuban independence and for the maintenance of a government able to protect life, property and individual liberty." The Cuban government has protested its ability to put down the negro insurrection with its regular and volunteer forces, which include many of the men who fought against the Spaniards in the war of liberation. ### BUILDING THE TURKEY.

We are not exhibiting the skeleton in the closet that gossips claim rattles its bones in every house but their own, but below we show the big bony frame of a turkey to remind turkey raisers they are not just feeders, but builders.

You never saw a hog raiser start little pigs on corn. They get milk, the bone, muscle, blood, the body builder. Same with the calf, human and otherwise.

So the successful turkey raiser cuts out fattener until time to finish for Thanksgiving and feeds to build bone, muscle, blood, organs—in short, a perfect physical turkey. He does this mostly with protein, and in doing so he is getting close to nature, for this is

mostly what the wild turkey lives and grows on in the woods and the mountains.

The wild turkey almost lives on bugs, worms, grasshoppers, snails, and Mother Turkey is just following her natural bent when she trills her pretty poult away from that cornmeal fattener out into the fields and the hills, where she shows them where to find that animal and vegetable food the Creator provides for their perfect growth.

Let the turkey raiser get back to nature; let him give Mother Turkey the eggs to hatch and poult to brood; let him remember turkeys are almost wild

and that is a danger and must feed much protein and not excess carbony.

drates. Poults need not be fed much nor long until they may be left to Mother Turkey's expert care.

Thirty hours after hatch start them on dry sweet breadcrumbs, a sprinkle of grit, and have water handy.

Let next meal be equal parts cottage cheese, breadcrumbs and tender dandelion chopped fine.

Let the next be equal parts hard boiled egg (an egg to every eight poult), cottage cheese and tender onion tops chopped up together. Lead them on to pinhead oatmeal, cracked red wheat, then whole wheat, and at last let them loose on nature with Mother Turkey.

Mother Turkey's motto is, "Feed little, but often, and feed mostly protein."

Yes; that's the ticket for building bon ton perfect turks.
