## Oregon Girls on Booster Trip To Eastern Cities

Polk County's Representative on Eastern Excursion Tells of Journey:  
Girls Warmly Welcomed Everywhere, and no Opportunity to Advertise Oregon is Overlooked. Boosting Literature Distributed.

We were taken into an auto and before reaching our hotel, we went on a sight-seeing trip through the city. To the Aquarium, from which we could view the Statue of Liberty, then through Wall Street, past the Stock Exchange, past the financial home of Rockefeller. We went through the "Ghetto", the very poor district, which was most pitiful and at the same time interesting. I certainly never realized that such conditions of poverty existed for certainly I had never seen anything of the kind in any of our Western cities. We went to the Martha Washington over headquarters in New York. Here we met a couple of women reporters. After lunch, one of the reporters took us through Tiffany's, a place filled with the most beautiful cut glass and china articles that we had ever seen. It was raining hard when we came out so our lady sent us all down to the Waldorf-Astoria in hand-soms, where we had tea and went through the hotel. That evening I called upon my uncle in Brooklyn; they came after me and I spent the rest of my time in New York with them. The following morning I went out to Ellis Isle and saw 400 immigrants lined up being tagged for their various destinations, exchanging their money for ours and meeting relatives. These immigrants are kept there at the expense of the steamship companies who bring them and every want is provided for. Back to the city on the boat, had lunch at the Martha Washington, the only exclusive woman's hotel in the world and spent the rest of the day shopping.

### Interested in the West.

In the evening Mr. Bates gave an illustrated lecture in one of the Y. M. C. A.'s and three of us girls went with him to leave some literature. We found these men very interested in our country. We left before the lecture, went back down town and saw Broadway at night--"the great White Way"--which was a pretty sight. We returned to the hotel just in time to go to the station--the

York and all felt that we were turning homeward. How we did dislike leaving so soon.

### Call at White House.

At seven in the morning we were in Washington, D. C. Went to our hotel, the New Ebbitt, headquarters for the army and navy. That morning we went in autos through the residence portion of the city. After lunch we went to see President Taft who received us in the East room of the White House. He was most lovely to us indeed and talked with us for about 20 minutes, then came out on the front steps and had his picture taken with our group. Then Senator Chamberlain, with a guide, took us through all the well-known and interesting rooms of the building.

Washington is a beautiful city and a great many of our party thought it by all means the prettiest city we had seen on our trip. At dinner in the evening we had Mr. Brown, of the Washington Times, with us, and then we went up to the Congressional Library, which indeed was the most beautiful building I have ever seen. We were only sorry that we had to leave so soon.

The next morning (Saturday) the girls all went through the great indoor market. Saturday is the most interesting day in the market for all provisions are brought in from the country.

### Visit Mt. Vernon.

Then out to Mt. Vernon, which to tell in detail would be quite a story for of course, we saw one interesting thing after another there, too numerous to mention. It was not only interesting from a historic standpoint, but also from the scenic side, for it was an ideal site for a home. It is interesting to know that it is kept today as near as possible like it was 120 years ago when Gen. Washington lived there.

We went back to Washington for luncheon at the Capitol at 1 o'clock where we had been invited by Senators Bourne and Chamberlain. A delicious lunch was served on a table especially and profusely decorated with roses for us. Besides the two

there. The party then went through the Capitol.

We left Washington at 6:30 for Cincinnati, which city we arrived in Sunday morning. Here we were met at the train by Mr. Costriss, a friend of Mr. Bates, who was present at our luncheon at the Multnomah before we started. He took us up to our hotel, the Gibson, then out to the Zoological Garden where we had lunch and stayed during the band concert. Part of our bunch then went over the river to Kentucky and the rest of us spent the afternoon seeing the city in the car. We dined at 6:30, then took our train for Indianapolis at 9:00, arriving in the latter city at 12:00, where we went to our hotel immediately.

### Sights at Indianapolis.

We slept late the next morning, then went to the Capitol, met Gov. Marshall; then were photographed before the Capitol for an Indianapolis paper, and then went through the Van Camp factory.

We left the city early in the evening for Chicago.

### In Chicago.

Arrived in Chicago at the Hotel Sherman at 7:10 Tuesday morning, June 18. Spent the morning in seeing the South side in an auto. In the afternoon the party again went out in a car to Lincoln Park and the North side, while I spent the afternoon visiting with some of my relatives. In the evening we dined in the College Inn, then went down the crowded street, Michigan avenue, to the Hotel Blackstone, where we met Mr. Williams, who gave us our tickets for the Convention for the following day. Next morning we went to the Convention at 10 o'clock. I staid until 12:00 and did not return in the afternoon as I was seated too far back to hear the speakers well, but was intensely interested in watching the "sway of the feelings" of the people in the time I was there.

We left the city at 6:30 for Madison, Wis., where we arrived at 10:20 that evening. Here Mr. R. B. Clarke, editor of the "American Thresherman," had autos waiting to take us to the New Park hotel, where we retired immediately. The next morning Mr. Clarke had nine cars for us, one for each girl and two girls from his office, which gave us an opportunity to meet some Madison girls. They took us all over their beautiful city. In the afternoon the party went through the Capitol and at 5:00 o'clock crossed Lake Monona in a chartered boat with an orchestra on board, over to Esther Beach, where a bounteous banquet was spread for us followed by a delightful program of entertainment. Recrossed the lake at 9:30 and arrived at the hotel just in time to take baggage and

We had a perfectly delightful time as a party on these last three days' trip, although terribly fatigued from the heat and the dirt. Five of our party left us at the Grand Dales and all sorry that the great trip had ended. The rest of us disbanded at Portland, each one of us arriving at our own towns, glad to be back to rest among the people who were instrumental in giving us this great pleasure.
