ECHO OF TITANIC DISASTER

Returning Missionary Hurrying to Mother's Bedside, is Lost. My Dear Friends in Dallas, Ore.— It has been some time since I last wrote to you from India, and about India. This morning I care not to tell you much about myself or the work, but about one of our dear co-workers here in the field. She and I had lived together three years in a bungalow quite by ourselves. She had the girls' school while I visited the Zanas and as many other homes as I possibly could in the surrounding 18 or 20 villages. In March of every year we have a conference of Indian Christian missionaries of the Central Provinces of India. Here we meet for four or five days—Methodist, Baptist, Christian, Evangelical, Presbyterian, Lutheran and Mennonite—all one in Christ Jesus, whom we love, serve and adore. While packing things for the conference, Miss Funk received a cablegram from Philadelphia, Pa., with passage for home prepaid and the direction that she was to leave on March 23. It was then the 20th. We knew that it was on account of her mother's illness who, though for the last month, or so had been getting so much better, but suddenly a change for the worse came. She hastened and left Bombay on March 23. On Easter Sunday she arrived in London expecting to leave for America on the Haverford but, owing to the strikes in England that steamship did not sail and she was booked for passage on the Titanic. She celebrated her birthday April 13, on that most beautiful vessel, but only two days was she permitted to live in her new year, and she too, as many others, found her grave in the icy waters of the Atlantic. But, oh, such a comfort to know that she did not go down, but up to her home on high to live with Him whom she so loved and to whom she had given her life and service. In her prayers she so often said: "Oh Father, we want to be our best for Thee, let us not be satisfied with the second best," and so often, too, she would sing, "Oh blessed Savior Keep Me White, etc." She was one to look on the bright side of everything and, after she had turned all her work over to me, and bade me farewell, she said: "Well, now Anna, keep smiling, no matter what comes." Little had I thought that those would be her last words to me here on this earth. The Lord alone knows what she was to me. The people among whom she worked loved her very much and did all they knew and could to please her the five years and three months that she was with them. They too, will miss her so much. It is such a comfort to rest in Him who giveth peace, sweet peace, that passeth all understanding. Yours in the service of the Master, ANNA P. BRAUN. Janjgil, C. P. India.

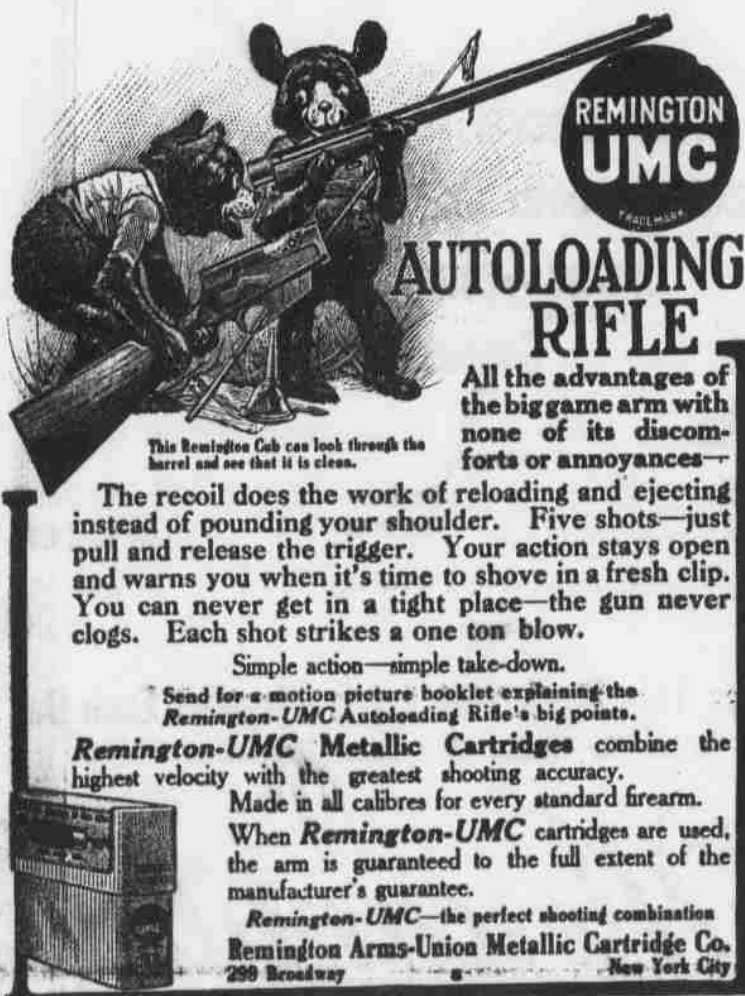
MAKING NATURAL FRUIT JAMS

Better than Cooked Jams Says Prof. Lewis of O. A. C. Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 18.—That natural fruit jams are far superior to cooked jams is the opinion of Prof. C. I. Lewis, of the O. A. C. department of horticulture. He describes his method of preparing them as follows: "Such fruits as red and black raspberries and strawberries make the most delicious uncooked jam, and one can enjoy a very palatable shortcake in the middle of the winter at very small expense. To prepare this jam, be sure first that your berries are sound. Throw out all soft, mouldy, or in any way decayed fruit. This is imperative. Then mix equal amounts of sugar and fruit, and crush the whole mixture carefully. Be sure that no berries are left whole. "Before putting into the jars, some people stir the fruit occasionally for several days to be sure that the sugar and fruit become thoroughly mixed. After the fruit and sugar are so mixed, put them into fruit jars but do not seal them. The only covering that should be given them is a little paper to keep out the dust. If the jars are sealed, the chances are that the fruit will spoil, but if left unsealed, it can be kept for some time. I have kept it for two years. "Red and white currants treated this way make a delicious jam. This is somewhat different from that known as sun-dried jam. The sun-dried jam is cooked somewhat. In the natural jam the flavor of the fruit is preserved."

Most of the noise made by motorcycles and automobiles is not necessary, but is inspired by the vanity of the rider or of the chauffeur, who is desirous of being looked at.
