GRANT SELLS FAMOUS BUCK

"Sanford" To Go To Big Texas Herd Says Journal.

U. S. Grant's famous buck "Sanford" has been sold. He starts soon for Sonora, Texas, and J. N. Ross, of that place, becomes his owner, says the Angora Goat Journal.

Sanford has had a most interesting career and has probably been the occasion of more "copy" concerning him than any other buck in the country. He attracted attention to himself when he won the sweepstakes prize at the eighth annual show held at Dallas in 1907. After that he consistently held his own, both in the show ring and as a breeder of show stock. Two does sired by him won first and second prize at the Northwest Angora Show at Dallas, 1912.

Mr. Ross, who has purchased him, is a large owner of Angora goats at Sonora and has been a number of years a steady customer of Mr. Grant's for bucks. We feel sure that we can congratulate Mr. Ross because he has now in his hand a buck which has few superiors in the United States.

"CAT TAILS" FOR COOPERAGE

Polk Resident Furnishes Portland Firm With Typha Plant.

The appearance of Peter Riddick, of near Polk station, on the streets the other day with a conveyance loaded with bundles of leaves of the ordinary "cat tails" or typha plant a product of the damp sections of the Pacific coast, led to the inquiry of uses made for the leaves.

Riddick stated that the leaves were being shipped to a Portland coooperation company and that they are used in the construction of barrels and kegs. The leaves are placed between the staves and heads to prevent leakage and makes them absolutely tight. The use of the typha leaves are common, it is said, in all coooperation plants of the country.
