WITH SIGHTLESS EYES

Falls City Lad Faces Dark Future with a Smile on His Lips

and a Laugh Which Greets the Stranger.

A LONE all day with only a faithful dog for a companion, blind Lee Perrin, of Falls City, works his nimble fingers industriously, manipulating various ropes and twines in the intricate process of hammock making. He is always happy and friends are few who have ever seen an expression of discontent or heard a sigh of discouragement or rebellion against his lot on his handsome, clear features. There is something about the boy, who plods on uncomplainingly, fingers ever lithe and responsive, working on one piece for weeks which at the most seldom brings more than a few dollars in return, that makes an ordinary, normal man feel ashamed of himself.

Lee's father and mother are separated, the father he has not seen for some time, the mother has entered the matrimonial field for a second time and is now living in Portland. This left Lee alone, his own support and the road to success in this line has been far from smooth. When just a tiny lad, perhaps seven years of age, he contracted a severe case of scarlet fever, which finally developed into diphtheria, and in spite of the efforts of physicians he was left totally blind.

Attended State School.

Several years ago he attended the State institution for the blind, and while there learned the art of making hammocks, and since then has been endeavoring in this manner to make his living. Even with the sun shining, beautiful flowers never attract; to him the sky is never blue and his world is what his personality makes it, a golden, contented sameness, peopled and beautified by his friends and his work.

In spite of his affliction he is very proud and burs for nothing. When he receives an order he works conscientiously and faithfully until it is finished and accepts his returns in a business-like manner and with a Francis Richter smile thanks the customer for his patronage. All who know the boy have grown to love him, endeavor to help him in any manner possible, and his gratitude for their kindness is pitiful to behold.

STATE NEWS

Touring interior Oregon this week is a big party of representative Portland business men, who are making an automobile excursion to Lakeview under the auspices of the Portland Commercial club. Everywhere along the line they are being accorded every possible courtesy, and Central Oregon's well-known hospitality is being extended.

Loganberry culture, a new industry, is growing to large proportions in this state. At Brooks alone 34,000 crates were shipped to a Portland cannery, netting the growers \$31,000. A total of 37 cars of loganberries was shipped from Brooks this year. The acreage given to this fruit is constantly on the increase.

The population of Oregon is to be increased between 30,000,000 and 35,000,000 this year, only the newcomers are young salmon and not people. That number of baby salmon will be imported into the state from the various hatcheries. The fish, when released, will be from five to eight months old and are expected to be able to fight their own battles thereafter.

Hotel men of the state have launched a campaign to attract Eastern tourists to Oregon. At a recent meeting of the state association it was decided to carry on extensive advertising and publicity work throughout the East to show the scenic beauties of the Pacific Northwest to the intending traveler. It is the plan to distribute many folders and pieces of attractive literature illustrating this subject.

President W. C. Brown, of the New York Central lines, told Portland people the past week that while the firm of the state have increased their products 56 per cent, consumption of the necessities has increased 60 per cent during the past ten years, and unless some remedy is found to equalize the two, the people of the United States will face a crisis before long. He urged the need of improved agricultural methods.

Lewiston has been the first to suggest a celebration in 1915 in honor of the opening of the Panama canal, and the completion of the Cello canal. All sections whose interests are affected by the opening of the Columbia and Snake rivers will be invited to join in what will be known as the Lewiston-Cello-Panama celebration. Tentative plans provide for a big excursion by river from Portland. The Lewiston Commercial club has the affair in charge.
