New Plant No. Model.

The Robins-Poultry company has just completed a large two-story house, the home of 1000 pullets, this winter. This is one of the most modern structures of its kind on the Pacific Coast. The building is 160x16 feet. The first floor contains feed room, 50-foot incubator room, and 100-foot brooder house. The entire upper floor is exclusively for laying stock. It is on the open-front style, the same as all the houses of the plant, and seems to be particularly adapted to climatic conditions in this locality.

One should see the plant to appreciate it. Hundreds of snow-white Leghorns dot the hillside, and the good, comfortable quarters to welcome them in the rainy season, look good. There is a nice stream of spring water running through all the houses, being piped from a large spring in the hillside. L. S. Robbins, the manager, has just returned from an extensive tour through Oregon and Washington, where he has been inspecting the leading poultry plants. The largest and best incubator he saw on his travels is in the plant here. He is always glad to show visitors
