### COMPANY ORDERS NEW CARS

#### Increased Fruit Production Causes Big Order For Equipment.

One thousand new refrigerator cars equipped with collapsible tanks with a capacity of 11,000 pounds of ice, will soon be delivered to the Pacific Fruit Express company, a subsidiary of the Southern Pacific company. The collapsible tanks will enable the company to use the cars for ordinary freight during the periods that the cars are not required for perishables. The first installment of these new cars will be started westward within another month and they will immediately go into service.

This order of 1000 new cars is an increase of ten per cent, and makes the total refrigerator equipment of this company 11,000 cars. The latest refrigerator ideas have been adopted in the building of the cars and a most effective insulation will line the interiors. Five years ago the Pacific Fruit Express company had 6600 of these cars, but the growing fruit and produce business of California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and other Pacific Coast states has caused nearly a thousand additional cars to be purchased annually.

The equipment of this character owned by the Pacific Fruit Express company represents an outlay of more than \$15,000,000. This new order will total nearly a million and a half dollars, at an approximate cost of \$1400 each. The increasing development of the West's horticultural and agricultural resources and the transformation of deserts into green orchards and fields creates the demand for more of these cars each year.

### PROFITS OF WALNUT RAISING

#### Monmouth Orchard Owner Pleased With Future Outlook.

In his walnut orchard J. B. Stump, of Monmouth, Oregon, believes he has a gold mine better even than the dairy business or the raising of sheep, sheep or goats. The first trees set out have now been growing eight years. Last year they averaged about five pounds to the tree and this year they will produce at least double that amount. Walnut growers expect a tree's increase to be steady until it produces 100 pounds per annum or even more. The price of walnuts is from 10 to 20 cents a pound. Trees 40 feet apart, or 30 trees to the acre producing 100 pounds of fruit would then mean 3000 pounds to the acre and at 10 cents a pound that figures \$3000 per acre and absolutely nothing to do but gather the fruit. This is a very conservative estimate, too. Mr. Stump is fortunate in having his trees on ground where frost has never touched them. He will this year plant 150 more grafted trees. The ground between the rows can be used for the first 10 years or more for other crops. And this seems to indicate good money in walnuts in the Willamette valley.

### MAY AGAIN VOTE ROAD TAX

#### People in District No. 1 Pleased With Experiment of Past Year.

The people of road district No. 1, Polk county, are talking about voting another special tax for road work next year, says the Willamette Times. They have made a fine start and have built about two miles of fine road this year. A new stone quarry has been opened and the rock crusher is still there for use, so a big portion of the expense will be cut out hereafter. A large percentage of the people more than get their tax money back by working on the road and they would get the same benefit next year. The people of that district are progressive and believe in the good roads movement. J. A. Botz has talked with many of the people of the district regarding the matter and all he saw are favorably inclined to keep the good work going. When the meeting is held regarding the matter, the people should appoint a committee to communicate with the automobile club at Portland and endeavor to get some financial assistance from them for they are anxious to have good roads as anybody for they are boosters for that purpose.
