HAS "WAR-TIME" NEWSPAPER

Canton (Ill.) Weekly Register of Nov. 5, 1861, is interesting. J. H. Nies, of Dallas, brought to this office this week a time-yellowed copy of the Canton Weekly Register published at Canton, Ill., under date of November 5, 1861, which is one of the most interesting of the many old newspapers saved by the war.

Issued a few months after the beginning of actual hostilities between the states, its columns naturally teem with news of the "insurrection" as the conflict was called during the early days. The paper was edited by Mr. Nies while a soldier and at the front and bears the ancient one-cent stamp that carried it, and the postmark of "Fairview, Ill." There are many interesting features about the paper, especially the market reports where eggs are quoted at "five cents per dozen," "butter, good, 10 cents per pound." There were strange doings even in those days, it appears, with army goods, for one article relates: "The singular development was made a few days ago in Washington, in respect to pistol cartridges given out to the cavalry, that they were filled, some with wooden plugs, and others with turnip seeds." Here is one of the jokes that made "em laugh in '61: "How many deaths" asked the hospital physician. "Nine." "Why, I ordered medicine for 10." "Yes, but one wouldn't take it." That joke is still doing business today.

Another. "After asking your name in the state of Arkansas, the natives are in the habit of saying, in a confidential tone: 'Well, now, what were your name before yer moved to these parts?' They paid men to enter the army, as for instance: 'The son of Richmond, B. I., gives each unmarried man \$36, and each married man \$60, who enlists in the army from that town.'"

The paper is neat typographically and shows much painstaking care in the arrangement of the news matter and the editorials. It is well edited and contains a strong article urging the people to "vote down this new fangled rag money factory." The newspaper was a strong advocate of specie payments.

"Let 'em pick if they want to," so illoqued the box emptier. "They aren't afraid of spoiling their complexions," (glancing sideways at the bunch by the furnace.)

"Mean thing! Think's he's cute! Put him out!" and other violent expressions not for print, came from the young lady members of the bedraggled bunch.

Just then a girl in dripping auburn hair, blue logger's shirt and dancing sandals strolled in supported on the arm of a box emptier. "Water, water," she pleaded. "I am so dry that I can hardly breathe. This California weather is alright for Californians, but I like rain, for me." She slushed and squashed over to the bunch of girls about the furnace and shook her hair out to dry.

Somebody over in the corner perched on a pile of hop sacks began "This is the Wettest Place I Ever Struck" and most of the weird assemblage joined heartily in on the chorus.

Right in front on a soft pile of Mother Earth rolled a bunch of youngsters. They were as happy and as busy as bees making delicious mud cakes which they mixed with the water wrung from their stockings they had taken off to dry.

"I don't think it's going to rain long. See, it's clearing now. I don't think I'll go home 'till I get my 12 boxes."

"Neither will I." "I never had any intention of going, Me," stated the girl in the auburn hair arising to her feet and gracefully scraping the snowshoe of mud from her sandal with a stick preparatory to returning to her row and basket for a second store.
