Mr. and Mrs. J. L. White and Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Zeller and their families returned late Monday night from an outing trip to Tillamook and Pacific City. They report a fine time and splendid roads for the most of the journey.

Rev. and Mrs. George H. Stieglitz, are expected from San Francisco this evening in Dallas. The Stieglitzs will probably make their home in Dallas as Mr. Stieglitz is pastor of the United Evangelical church of Rickreill.

Great Scenic Wonder. That Crater Lake is the greatest scenic wonder in America was the decision of the party of seventy noted scientists who have just visited Oregon. They were amazed at the spectacle and as a result of their visit this great attraction will be widely advertised throughout the whole world.

Northwestern Granaries Fall. With a 20 per cent increase over the grain crop of last year, the Pacific Northwest states have their gran-

aries full to the bursting point and the railroads are hauling to furnish cars enough to haul the grain to market. Receipts in the Portland area already aggregate 800 carloads more than for a like period last year and the movement continues heavy.

Hold Flower Shows. The Portland Floral society will stand sponsor for a number of flower shows each year. A chrysanthemum display will be the first of the series and will occur in November. Another show of flowers is planned for next spring and in the late Summer a dahlia show will probably be held.

Bandon Recorder: Work is proceeding right along on the new Presbyterian church, and with a few weeks of good weather the building will be inclosed and then it can be finished up with little difficulty, even though the rainy season does set in.

Gold Hill News: An experiment in peanut growing attempted the present season by Charles Ertwein has resulted so successfully that he will plant an extensive patch next year to demonstrate yet another possibility of the Rogue river valley. Mr. Ertwein cultivated a single row this season, the plants producing peanuts of large size and excellent quality.

Nehalem Enterprise: A log measuring seven feet four inches in diameter and 22 feet in length, scaling 10,000 board measure, was cut up at the Wheeler mill and required nearly two days to dispose of, figuring in the breakdowns that resulted in handling the log owing to its great weight. It is estimated that the weight was over 40,000 pounds.

To Roped Forests. Thousands of young Douglas fir trees will be planted in the forest reserves of Oregon and Washington this Winter. Twelve thousand acres

are to be reforested and reseeded. For this purpose 100,000 saplings, mostly two years old, will be used, also a large quantity of seed. In the Stiuslay mountains 4,000 acres will be planted and in the Mount Hood region 2,000 acres additional.

Lumber Market Improves. Loggers and lumbermen are again proud of their inning. After a summer in which there was a loss from forest fires than for many years, the lumber market is in better condition than for a long time. Both rail and steamship business is good and indications are that the winter will be a good one for the sawmill business.
