"SHORT CUT" DEPLORED

President Winter Sounds Warning Note in Address at College Relative to Modern Tendency.

In the account of the opening exercises of Dallas College printed in Friday's Observer, an injustice was unintentionally done President Winter in the statement relative to his address. The subject of his remarks was mainly devoted to the different classes of students found in colleges, and their ability and inclination to secure an education. Some went because they were "sent" and others attend of their own accord. President Winter deplored the tendency of modern times toward "short cut" methods. "The world today," said he, "is full of short cut doctors, short cut lawyers, short cut preachers, short cut teachers, and thus we have numberless pettifoggers, religious visionaries, and all sorts of professional fakes as a result of this short cut system, in converting the least amount of education into a comfortable living, or ready cash, in the shortest time possible."

The whole modern tendency is toward new ideas and new thought in religious as well as educational themes and peculiar ideas are being promulgated by some eminent men and advanced thinkers. In order to emphasize his position in this regard President Winter used the following illustration:

"A modern English writer who has watched the drift of the day toward blank agnosticism and materialism has put his apprehensions into form: 'I believe in wheat and rice; Not in virtue and in vice; In a stated cause of crimes. In Macaulay and the Times. Hydrogen inflames ambition; Nitrogen inspires valour; All that's great and good in men May be found in Oxygen. The address was full of sound thought and self-evident facts; a careful exposition of the real need of education and the advantages of securing it along well established lines. PARALYSIS ENDS IN DEATH

Mrs. Elizabeth Titus Succumbs to Attack of Dread Disease.

Elizabeth Titus died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. H. Morrison, Thursday night, September 26, of paralysis. The funeral was held at the Baptist church on Saturday, September 28, at 2 o'clock, and interment took place at the old Polk cemetery. Rev. H. John Vine, officiating. Elizabeth Titus was born in Ohio, December 25, 1834. She came to Oregon in 1862, and had lived here practically 50 years. The family first settled in Dallas, but moved to Washington, where they lived for 8 years, finally returning to Dallas. She was married to David Marshall Titus in 1860, and was the mother of three sons and one daughter. Two sons are known to be living, one in California, and one in Seattle, Washington. Mrs. J. H. Morrison is the only daughter. Mrs. Titus died in 1899. She leaves 11 grandchildren, several of whom live in Dallas.

OLD SETTLER HEARS LAST CALL

Former Polk County Man Dies at Portland Home at Advanced Age.

John Henry Robbins died at his home in Portland on Friday, September 27, and was buried at McCoy, where funeral services were conducted on Saturday, September 28, from the Christian church, of which deceased was a member.

Deceased was born in Henry county, Kentucky, 78 years ago. He was married there, and came to Oregon in 1853. There were three children by this marriage, Mrs. Sarah Phillips of Portland; Mrs. Emma Reese, of McMinnville; and then, who died several years ago. His first wife died during the trip across the plains from Kentucky to Oregon. Mr. Robbins was married the second time to Miss Margaret Harvey of Amity, in 1857. Five children were born to this union. Grant of Washington; Arthur, of Portland; Elmer, of McCoy; Dan and Stella, of Portland. For many years Mr. Robbins conducted a large meat store in Portland and was an accomplished violinist. He sold his store and went to the Coast of Alaska, where he had large mining interests for a number of years, but during strike troubles there he lost most of his property. He returned to Polk county, settling near McCoy, where he built a fine home, and was considered a farmer of unusual ability.
