APTAIN ALFRED BISHOP BEERS, the new commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, was a soldier at the age of sixteen and served throughout the civil war. He enlisted as a private in the Sixth Connecticut volunteers, and during his military career he was mentioned in regimental orders for bravery and meritorious service in the field and was several times promoted, reaching the rank of captain in 1864. He participated in the campaign against Richmond, the siege of Petersburg, the practice must stop. After the war Captain Beers became a lawyer in Bridgeport, Conn., and was judge of the city court for seventeen years.
