Cavalry Hiding from Air Scouts In British War Game

IN the recent British maneuvers great attention was given to aeroplane scouting, which was carried on by both of the "contending" armies with an effectiveness that evidently surprised the military authorities themselves. It was, of course, the object of the commanders of the opposing forces to screen their troops as much as possible from the aerial observations of "the enemy." Accordingly detachments on the march when it was possible availed themselves of the cover given by hedge rows and woods. The photograph reproduced above shows a cavalry detail of the famous Scots Greys hugging the shelter of a copse, as the English call a grove of young trees, in order to hide their movements from the air scouts.
