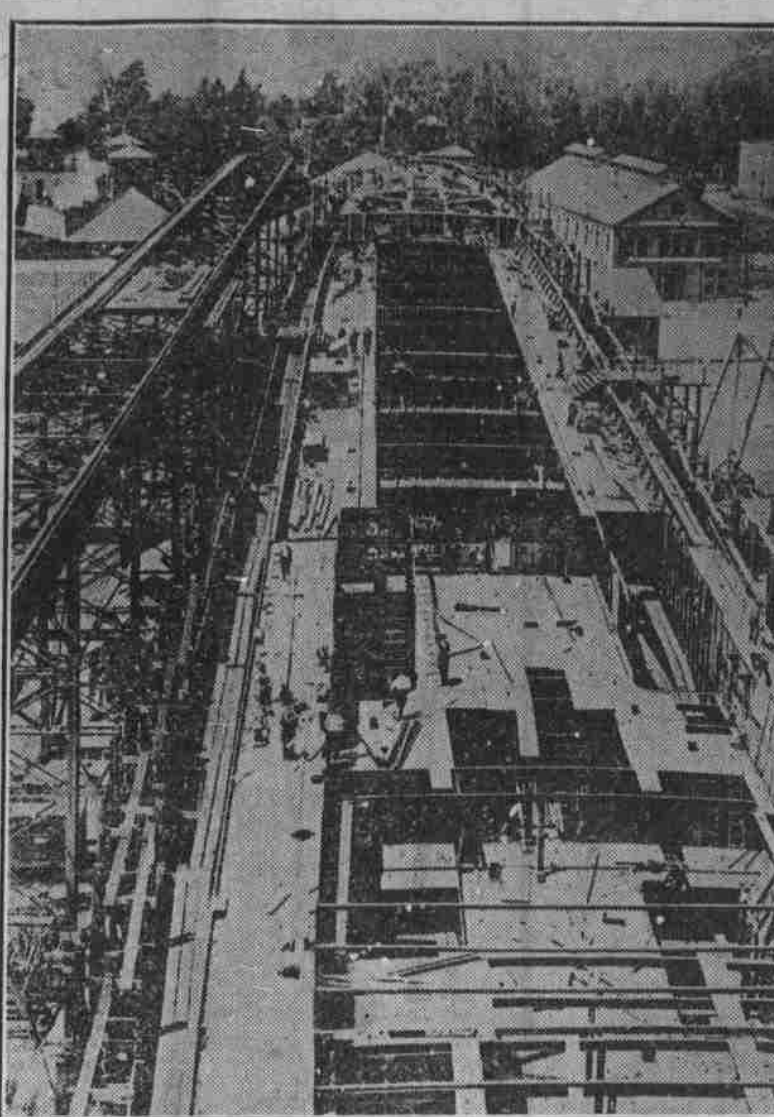

Collier Jupiter, Now Being Built at Mare Island Yard



THE largest vessel ever built on the Pacific coast is in process of construction at the Mare Island navy yard, San Francisco. It is the Collier Jupiter, destined for service in the United States navy. It will be 528 feet in length and sixty-five feet in breadth, with a draft of twenty-eight feet when loaded to capacity. Fourteen thousand tons of coal and oil will be its maximum cargo, and its total displacement will be 20,000 tons. Like the sister ships among the naval colliers, the Cyclops and the Neptune, the Jupiter will be able to replenish the bunkers of two ships at sea at the same time, thanks to the placing of the derricks in two rows, one on either side. This huge ship, so necessary to the warfare and in war time even to the existence of the fleet, will carry no armament.
