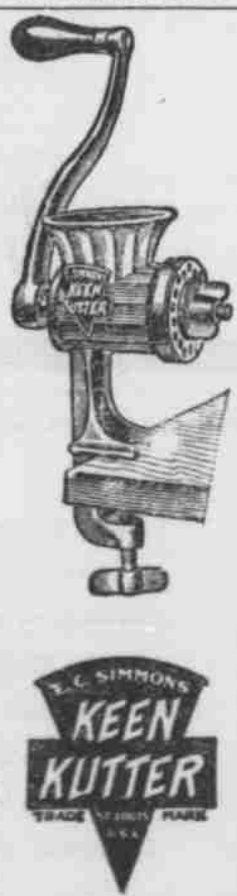

PARCELS POST.

The Parcels Post Bill passed by the last Congress was its greatest work. It benefits the Oregon merchant and farmer. By it you send 11 pounds on any rural route for 15 cents; 11 pounds on any city route for 15 cents; 11 pounds to any customer within 50 miles for 35 cents; 11 pounds to any customer between 50 and 100 miles of your store or home for 45 cents. But 11 pounds from Chicago and other mail-order cities will cost not less than \$1.32.

Senator Bourne is entitled to the credit for the construction and authorship of this bill, which goes into effect January 1, 1912. Had Bourne neglected this bill in April (primary time), it could not have become a law. He stuck to his post regardless of personal danger.

Bourne has lived in Oregon 34 years. He owns large interests in several counties. He is a strong supporter of the Oregon System, having assisted in its formation. His speech on Popular Government was issued to 2,700,000 readers at his own expense, and he has advertised the state throughout the world.
