California Girl a Wonder At Long Distance Swims

WITH tears of happiness and sobs of relieved anxiety the mother of Nellie Schmidt clasped her daughter into her arms and raised kisses of joy upon her. Nellie, who is the champion woman swimmer of California, had just safely completed the feat of swimming around the famous Seal rocks, off the Cliff House, San Francisco. For those who do not know this is considered a dangerous task for even the most expert of male swimmers. Miss Schmidt swam the mile against strong tides and rippling currents in 34 minutes 50 seconds. Her other feats of importance were as follows: Aug. 20, 1911, crossed Golden Gate in record time of 42 minutes; Aug. 11, 1912, crossed San Francisco bay in 3 hours 6 minutes. Her swim conclusively proves the right of her claim of being the woman speed champion in open water. It is doubtful if even Miss Vera Neave of England, holder of the world's mile record, could outdistance the Alameda wonder.

Newport Signal: Lincoln county soil is well adapted to the growth of peppermint. Joseph Swearingen, living near Toledo, left a bottle of the oil with Major Hopkins, which had been distilled from plants which he had grown this year.

Eugene Register: Cecil Sluyter, who lives near Fern Ridge, killed a beautiful white brant yesterday and it was brought to Eugene to be mounted. It is pure white, except the tips of its wings, which are jet black. They are not common in this country, but are frequently seen in the Mississippi valley and inter-mountain states.

Bellevue correspondence McMinnville Telephone-Register: From a three acre tract, cleared last February by Henry Clark, plowed and set to hops in March, a yield of 2350 pounds of hops, after they were dried was obtained. Between rows planted to spuds, pumpkins and kale, a yield of 180 sacks of potatoes, 14 large woodruff loads of pumpkins, and several tons of kale not yet harvested were obtained.
