"Everybody Worked, Too."

It was some busy night around the office, too. The Observer was connected directly with Portland over the long distance wire. Several other towns in the state were also receiving the service, and when the operator at the Portland end began sending, the fellow who wasn't quick enough to grab the stuff didn't get it. Things were humming all down the line, and one bulletin followed another in rapid succession. At the receiving end in this office one man sat, with his left ear glued to a receiver, from 7:20 practically until 11 o'clock while another wrote the news on glass slides for the flashing process.

But the crowd stuck around and seemed glad to get the news. The rain didn't interfere to any great extent, but those who didn't relish the dampness sought the windows in the court house and read the bulletins from the reverse side of the sheet, the operator accommodatingly turning them around for their benefit.

Others Got It Too.

The Observer telephone service was furnished to members of the Woodmen of the World at their lodge rooms, the Armory, where several of the First Voters Taft club and officers of the O. N. G. had gathered, to the Star Theater, and to other places where the results were carried after being copied from the screen opposite the editorial rooms.

The service was given valuable assistance by Artist Hayes who had supervision of the lantern slide lettering. The dull moments were filled in with occasional cartoons of Mr. Hayes' ingenious make and there was scarcely a moment when the large crowd was not entertained in some manner. COUNTY RESULTS HOLDS MANY SURPRISES.

not probable that the result will be affected.

Hill Defeats Paddock.
Vard Hill, of Independence is the successful aspirant for representation from Polk county, over E. E. Paddock, also of Independence, and the result is attributed to the big vote which Chester P. Gates, of Dallas, prohibition candidate, polled. Mr. Gates carried two Dallas precincts and polled a large vote all over the county, running far ahead of his ticket. Practically all of these votes came from Republicans—and he is tributary to Mr. Gates' personality and his undoubted ability for the position.

Frank Wins Over Toole.
Although Walter L. Toole, Jr., of Dallas, carried Lincoln county by a majority of 250, he lost Polk county by 455 and was therefore 235 votes to the bad. Toole lost heavily in Dallas and in Falls City where he expected his largest vote. He did not carry his party strength in any instance and attributed his defeat to a number of causes. He declares that his military record was used against him by friends of his opponent, and that this was sprung in the later days of the campaign when he had no opportunity to answer it.

Seymour Wins Easily.
County Superintendent H. C. Seymour has won by a majority of more than 500 votes, although during the earlier portion of the returns, it looked as though Arnold, the prohibition candidate would run him a close race. Objections to Mr. Seymour's progressive methods, and opposition from districts where he made a determined effort to increase the efficiency of the schools, is given as the cause of the exceptionally large vote which his opponent received. But he was given a good vote in many of the precincts and his administration of the office has thus received the stamp of approval from the great majority.

Teal Will Be Judge.
The complexion of the next county court will still remain Republican despite the Democratic landslide, John Teal being elected judge by a majority of more than 100, while George Wells, of Buena Vista, wins for commissioner by the largest majority on the ticket where opposition was encountered. The big vote given Mr. Teal in his home town of Falls City, in Dallas, and in Independence, being largely responsible for this outcome, although he received a good vote in many of the country precincts. Wells ran like the proverbial "scared rabbit" and from the first there was absolutely no doubt of his success.

Tracy Staats, for treasurer, and Chapman for coroner, had no opposition and were elected by their usual majorities.

Suwer, democratic candidate for surveyor, has won by a majority of more than 260 over R. F. Beasley, Republican incumbent.

Returns Slow in Coming.
The returns were slow in coming in Wednesday, and a big crowd filled the different offices at the court house eagerly awaiting word from the different precincts. The race was so close in two or three instances that each succeeding precinct to report changed the result somewhat and kept everybody on the anxious seat.

The extreme size of the ballot made the counting slow and the South Dallas precinct, one of the largest in the county, did not report until nearly 6 o'clock Wednesday night. Kola did not finish until 11 o'clock and, as everything depended in the clerkship

and the assessor's race on these two precincts, naturally there was much anxiety until the returns were in.

TWO CHARGED WITH TRESPASS

William and Jacob Schummelpfenig were arrested on Wednesday by Sheriff Grant on a complaint sworn out by Gottlieb Stump charged with trespass. They were arraigned before Justice Holman during the afternoon and pleaded not guilty. They were bound over until Monday afternoon for preliminary examination.
