FUEL HOG IS WELL NAMED

New Apparatus at Light Plant Has Tremendous Appetite, 'Tis Said.
Down at the plant of the Oregon Power company or, more properly speaking at the base of the fuel conveyor from the Dallas Lumber and Logging company's mill to the fuel bins of the light company is an immense machine called the "fuel hog." Its particular job being to grind up into fine mesh all sorts of slab wood and other timbers thrown into it. It is operated by a 100 horse-power electric motor which has recently been installed and enables the light and power company to use fuel at a great saving in handling. After passing through the "hog" which may be said to have a cast-iron digestion, the fuel is dumped into the conveyor with the sawdust and other fine refuse from the saw mill and is carried into the company's fuel bins for use as needed.
