1913 GETS NOISY WELCOME IN DALLAS

SCREECHING WHISTLES AND CLANGING BELLS GREET ADVENT OF BRAN, SPANKING NEW YEAR.

MANY WATCH MEETINGS

Amidst the clanging of bells, the screech of whistles and the shouts of late revelers, 1913 was duly ushered in at Dallas at midnight Tuesday. The noisy welcome to the new year followed the precedents of former advents of this nature and was thoroughly in keeping with the occasion. The fearful wailing of the siren at the plant of the Oregon Power company was the predominant feature of the midnight hubbub but the deep-toned "lunger" at the Dallas Lumber and Logging company's plant did its share to add to the welcome. Those who had retired and were "wrapped in the arms of Morpheus" were thoroughly awakened and made to understand that another year had been chronicled on the calendar.

Many Watch Meetings.

Watch meetings were held at the various churches and at some of the lodge rooms and private homes of the city. The most interesting public service was probably at the Presbyterian church on Court street, where a large audience listened to a lecture on the Holy Land by Rev. Denmore. Other ceremonies and customs in conformity to the occasion were features of the meeting at this and other churches.

Practically all business was suspended in the city on New Year's day, the clothing and dry goods stores remaining closed all day, although the grocers and meat markets did not bring their keys into use until noon. Some of the officers remained on duty at the Court House closing up the business of the year, but the banks were closed and the postoffice observed the usual holiday hours. The County Court did not meet, but held its regular monthly session yesterday instead.

While the places of business were closed so far as the public was concerned the breathing spell was taken advantage of by the merchants to close up the business of 1912 and arrange their books for the new year. In nearly all of the establishments, especially those that had advertised closing out and clearance sales, the proprietors and a few of the clerks were busy marking down goods in preparation for the resumption of business yesterday.

During the afternoon a Sunday quiet prevailed on the streets and the few pedestrians seen simply wandered from place to place without definite object only to kill time. There were no public meetings of any kind and even the skating rink did not open its doors during the afternoon or night.

DEATH IS RESULT OF INJURIES IN WRECK

on which the camp foreman, A. B. Martin was returning.

Engine Turns Turtle.

"The engine was within 50 feet of the washout before it was discovered. Engineer Englund immediately applied the brakes but the next moment he felt the track giving away beneath him. The locomotive toppled over to the right and he jumped in the opposite direction. Rowell and Pomeroy were not so fortunate and being on the opposite side of the cab could not escape. Leaving the track the engine turned over on her side and landed completely upside down 15 feet below on the very banks of the river. In the crash many of the steam pipes of the engine were broken, causing the steam to escape in a dozen places, horribly scalding the men that were left in the cab. Pomeroy in a few moments managed to extricate himself from the wreck, but not before he had been badly burned by the escaping steam.

Scalded by Steam.

"As he staggered from the wreck his first thoughts were of his companions and as Englund at that moment came rushing to the rescue he realized that Rowell was still beneath the locomotive. On investigating they found Rowell pinned to the ground by the broken bows of the cab. In a cloud of steam they worked until at last they succeeded in pulling Rowell from the wreck. It was seen at once that he was fatally burned. His entire body was fearfully scalded, but in spite of his injuries he was still conscious. Although seriously injured himself, Pomeroy assisted in getting Rowell back on the railroad track, where a handcar was secured and the injured men taken back to the camp where their wounds were temporarily treated.

Steamer Wenona Arrives.

"By this time the steamer Wenona had arrived at the landing place and on learning of the accident waited until the men were brought down from the camp on the handcar and placed aboard the boat. The men were compelled to transfer the car around the washout, but at 8:30 the boat left for Astoria. Arriving here both men were rushed to the hospital where they were given every treatment known to science. However it was soon seen that nothing could be done for Rowell and he expired at 2:15 in the afternoon. Reports late last night are to the effect that Pomeroy will recover although he is suffering excruciating pain as a result of being scalded by the steam.

Rowell Was Popular.

"C. F. Rowell had been in the employ of the Portland Lumber company about two years. He was unmarried, a member of the Knights of Pythias of Dallas and a favorite among his acquaintances.

"A. B. Martin, the foreman of the camp, who accompanied the injured men to this city, is grief-stricken over the affair and it was in broken sentences last night that he related the details of the accident. He has wired to Dallas to learn what disposition to make of the body."
