SOLONS HUSTLE AS SENATOR'S END DRAWS NEAR

ed the Moser bill providing for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the coming biennium to create a home for wayward girls, after Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin, of the department of public safety of Portland, had been accorded the unusual privilege of addressing the senate in support of the measure. President Malarkey, in explaining his vote, which was cast against the bill, said he believed the senators had "been carried away by sentiment" which is just what many others believed. He said he favored the retention of the wayward girls in rescue homes under state supervision, where they could be detained at a stated sum per capita rather than for the creation of another state institution and another drain on the treasury. It is probable that several other senators thought the same way but few of them had the nerve to get up and say so.

Late Sessions Saturday.

Although the hands of the clock in the senate chamber indicated 20 minutes to midnight, it was really 1:20 when that body adjourned last Sunday morning after passing more than 80 bills during the day and practically clearing up its calendar. The house had adjourned at 12:15. This haste and long session was occasioned by the announcement that the senate would receive no house bills after Saturday. It was supposed that the house would concur in this plan, but it failed to do so, in fact it is broadly asserted that the whole thing was framed up by three or four on the inside, to keep the two branches from adjourning on Saturday afternoon until Monday and to compel the members to get "a hustle on." Whether or not this is true, the hustle was very much in evidence and there was plenty doing in this old capitol building last week.

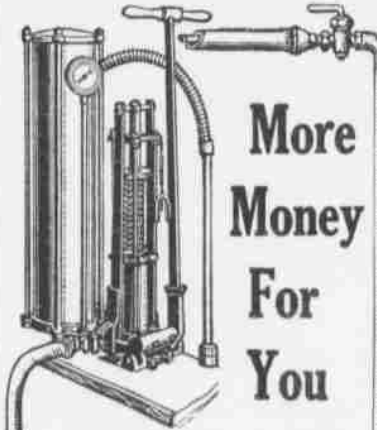

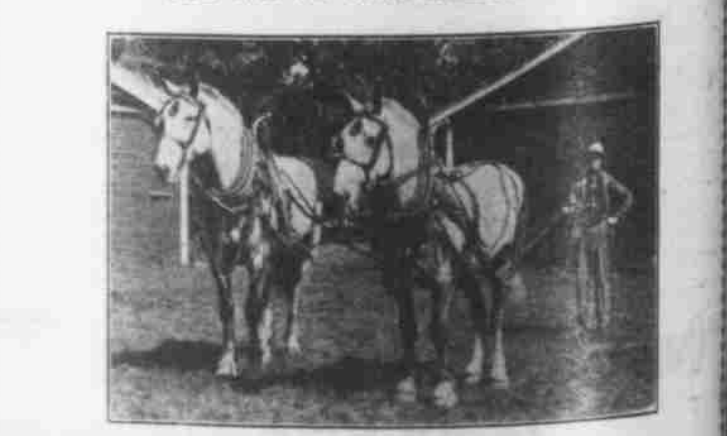
