without cost, the crusher now located at the city quarry, might be brought to the city and set up for operation, and the rock shipped in could be crushed and delivered on the streets at a less rate than it cost under the former plan of crushing it at the quarry and hauling it to the city. It was further stated that the crusher must be brought to the city for overhauling, anyway, after which it might be set up and placed in operation here. The matter was left with the street committee to investigate and report.

Macadam Street Work.

In the matter of the extension of further improvement of some of the residence streets with macadam, it was suggested that it might be advisable to consult property owners regarding it, and the street committee was instructed to look into the matter. It was reported that some of the residents on Hayter street were asking for the macadamizing of that thoroughfare and there might be other streets in the city that it would be advisable to improve.

To Visit Grants Pass.

On motion of Councilman Coad the former action of the council in providing that the entire body visit other cities to investigate paving was rescinded, and on motion of Campbell the mayor was instructed to appoint a committee of three to go to Grants Pass for the purpose of investigating the paving done there by a company which proposed to bid on the work in Dallas. The mayor appointed Coad and Fenton, of the street committee and Risser, of the finance committee to make such investigation. It may be said in passing that the Grants Pass company has thus far, made the lowest tentative offer for the work of any of the companies which have investigated conditions here, and for this reason it was deemed advisable for the council to make a thorough investigation of its work in order to be informed of the facts when bids are opened.

ected with any election. It is unlawful for any candidate or person representing such candidate either directly or indirectly, to give or provide, or pay, either wholly or in part, the expense of giving or providing any meat or drink or other entertainment or provision, clothing, cigars, cigars or tobacco, to or for any person for the purpose of or with intent or hope to influence that person or any other person to give or refrain from giving his vote to or for any candidate x x x x or measure before the people.

In the light of this law and the enfranchisement of the woman household political discussion on election day should be carefully approached. If you don't agree with the wife, just let her have her way for if you attempt to influence her to vote your way, you may be against the law. In order to be on the safe side, you'd better cook your own meals, too.
