GRIM REAPER SUMMONS

Dee W. Dunn Dies From Attack of Erysipelas, Following Short Illness; Funeral Services on Sunday.

Dee W. Dunn died at his home near Polk Station on Friday, April 4, of erysipelas, after an illness lasting but little more than a week. Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist church in this city on Sunday afternoon, April 6, by Rev. D. Lester Fields, and interment took place in Odd Fellows' cemetery.

Dee William Dunn was born in Sheridan, Oregon, Feb. 7, 1877, and was, therefore, 36 years, one month and 25 days old when the Grim Reaper summoned him. In 1879 the family moved to the farm near Dallas where he spent the remainder of his life.

He was converted during the Ross meeting in the spring of 1894, and joined the M. E. church, South, and was an active member until it disbanded. He was united in marriage to Miss Lola McColm at Dayton, Oregon, June 12, 1907. On December 1, 1907, he united with the Methodist Episcopal church, and has always been an earnest and faithful member. He leaves to mourn his death a wife, and daughter, Margaret, aged four years, a father, A. W. Dunn, and four brothers, T. A. and E. C. of Dallas, and C. A. and J. H., of Portland. "He was one of the truest, kindest and noblest of Christian boys that ever lived and only those who were with him all the time will ever know his worth," is the tribute paid him by his pastor.

with his clip in the future and will ultimately result in general improvement of the quality.

Oppose Tariff Cut. Mohair producers of the Willamette valley are protesting against the threatened reduction of the tariff on mohair. William Brown & Co., of Salem, sent an urgent telegram to the members of the Oregon delegation in congress asking them to oppose the proposed reduction. This company has also sent a long letter on the subject to Oscar Underwood. The telegram says:

"It is rumored in trade papers that the ways and means committee have made a duty on raw wool of 15 per cent ad valorem and a duty on raw mohair of 30 per cent. The Wilson bill made a difference of 50 per cent between raw mohair and the resultant manufactured products. We cannot sell our raw mohair abroad; we must sell it to American users, who are principally the mohair plush manufacturers.

We therefore, urge you to vote in caucus for a difference of at least 40 per cent between the duty on raw mohair and the duty on manufactured yarns and mohair pile fabrics. In other words, if the committee has made a duty on raw mohair of 30 per cent, then the duties on resultant products should be as follows: Scoured, 40 per cent; sorted, 50 per cent; tops, 55 per cent; yarns, 70 per cent; pile fabrics, 75 per cent."

reported that the city would build itself to build the concrete foundations, if the court would attend to the steel construction. This, it is understood, the court has agreed to do, so independence will at last get her bridge.

May Start Rock Crushers. The matter of starting operations at the two rock crushing plants owned by the county has been under consideration by the court, but no definite understanding has yet been reached.

and towns, and its introduction made the statement on the floor of the state that it only affected the town of Gaston and was for the special benefit of that place. Whether or not the provisions can be applied to all other towns is a question over which attorneys disagree, and if it shall be held that no legislature may interfere with the rights of city charters, it is certain that the act will be of no force and effect, until the people of the cities themselves shall place the stamp of approval upon it.

The Falls City case is attracting considerable attention, owing to the legal points involved and the sweeping effect it may have on future judicial proceedings and the levying and collection of assessments.

Other Suits Filed. G. W. Hill has begun an action against L. H. Shultz et al for the foreclosure of a certain mortgage to secure the payment of a claim of \$3,791.50 with interest from August 1, 1912, and \$230 attorney's fees. H. H. Belt appears for plaintiff.

Court House Notes. Requiring the payment of filing fees in the sum of \$42, a trust deed was filed with County Clerk Robinson last week, that is one of the most voluminous documents ever recorded in Polk county. It is granted by the Northern Idaho and Montana Power company to the American Trust and Savings bank, and the consideration is given as "\$1."

Several United States patents to lands sold many years ago by Indians have been filed for record with County Clerk Robinson. In every case they are the photographed duplicates of the original patents. The necessity for securing the duplicates is explained by the fact that the Indians to whom they were issued failed to have them recorded and the last purchaser must do so to complete his title.

Bounties on two bobcat pelts were paid by County Clerk Robinson Monday.

In re the county road petitioned for by D. G. Gibson and others, the appointment of W. H. Cadle is hereby revoked, he not being qualified, and John W. Orr is appointed in his stead to act with F. M. Suver, county surveyor, and Thomas W. Brunk, as board of county road viewers.

County warrants issued in 1912, amounting to \$89.00, drawn on the general and road funds, were ordered cancelled for the reason that they had been issued on duplicate billing.

Court Notes. The court also made an order for the furnishing of the offices of the court house with linoleum for the floors, and County Judge Teal was authorized to call for bids for the same. Some of the floors are in bad condition, and growing worse, it is said, and it is believed that linoleum is the most economical manner of protecting them.

Nothing came up at the recent meeting regarding the proposed investment of \$1000 in a county gravel bar, and the purchase of machinery to equip the same. It is reported in this connection that the commissioners have secured an extension of the option for the purchase of the bar, the high water of the past few days making it impossible to survey the plat.

ed. It is Judge Teal's idea that the crushers should not be operated by the day, as in the past, but that the work should be let by contract to the lowest bidder, and that much county money would be saved by this method. He thinks that the court should first determine how much rock would be required to complete the road improvement decided on, and that, thereafter, bids should be called for, both for simply crushing the rock, and for crushing it and delivering it on the roads. One of these crushers is in the Willamette neighborhood, where a special road tax has again been voted by the taxpayers, and the other is located at the Lee quarry, southwest of the city. In the event that the latter is started, it is probable that road improvement will be done on the roads in that vicinity, especially the highway running from the Pedee neighborhood to Falls City.
