two-inch wearing surface, at the esti-
mate of the Clark-Henry company
for \$1.44 per square yard.

Paving Ordinance Read.
The long ordinance providing for
the hard surface improvement was
read by City Auditor Gregory and
passed to second reading.

In the matter of the possible neces-
sity of readjusting the bids, in or-
der to overcome some alleged illegal-
ity in the proceedings was suggest-
ed, but the representative of the
Clark-Henry company stated that
his company had secured legal opin-
ion on the matter and had found that
there was no necessity for such pro-
ceeding, and that they were willing
to settle the matter so far as the
council was concerned and the motion
to accept the bid and read the ordi-
nance followed the foregoing an-
nouncement.

Fairview Avenue Bids Rejected.
Owing to some irregularities in the
bids for the improvement of Fair-
view avenue, all bids were rejected
and the city auditor was instructed
to readvertise for bids on plans and
specifications to be furnished by City
Engineer Flagg.

In the matter of street sprinkling
it was reported that the work could
be done for 75 cents per hour. The
matter was left with the street com-
mittee with power to act.

On motion of Staats a resolution
was ordered drawn transferring \$1000
from the general fund to the street
fund for such uses as may be neces-
sary.

BIRD LOVERS WAR WITH TRUST

**WHOLESALE MILLINERS PRO-
TEST AGAINST PROPOSED
PROTECTIVE LAW.**

**Trade in Bird Plumage Grows to Enor-
mous Proportions; Country Being
Depopulated of Birds For Millin-
ery Users.**

The destruction of great numbers
of native birds which are the natural
enemies of insects has at last aroused
the law makers. The fight is now be-
ing waged in Congress by bird lovers,
scientists and farmers on the one hand
and the millinery interests of New
York, Boston and Philadelphia on the
other hand.

The point at issue is the passage of
a provision in the tariff act which pro-
hibits the importation of "aigrettes"
and the plumage of other wild birds
into this country, except ostrich plumes
and the feathers of domestic fowls.
The ways and means committee has
reported favorably on this section of
the tariff act, but the wholesale mil-
liners have combined and are using
every effort to defeat it.

Some States Prevent It.
The trade in plumage of native
birds is now illegal in some states,
but not in others. As long as the
government permits the importation
of goods which are contraband in
certain states, it is practically impos-
sible to prevent the use and sale in
other states.

"If our school children, teachers,
and bird lovers will write immedi-
ately to their senators and congress-
men asking for their assistance in the
passage of this measure, we can at
one stroke accomplish one of the
greatest steps in wild bird protection
that has ever been taken. We can
save untold numbers of our song,
insectivorous and plume birds from
one end of the nation to the other,"
said Mrs. T. Gilbert Pearson, secretary of
the National association of Audubon
Societies.

Demand Grows.
The demand for plumage of wild
birds for millinery purposes during
the past 25 years has grown to enor-
mous proportions. In an effort to
supply the markets, our woods, fields
and sea coasts have been combed sys-
tematically by plume hunters to get
bird wings and breasts to use in the
millinery trade. Many varieties of
birds are in the best plumage during
the breeding season and they are killed
at this time and the young are
left in the nest to die of starvation."

"The investigations of the Biologi-
cal Survey of the Department of
Agriculture shows that the greater
number of our wild birds are of ben-
efit in protecting crops," continued
Mr. Pearson. "The light is clear-cut
and we believe the farmers, fruit
growers and others throughout the
country will raise their voices against
the millinery trust which seeks to de-
populate the bird world."

Chautauqua Plan Appeals.
Mr. Ellison of the Ellison-White
Chautauqua company was present at
the meeting and explained in detail
the plans under which his company
proposed to put on a week's program
in the city. He stated that he would
close a deal if a guarantee of 600
tickets at \$2.50 each was made by the
citizens, and suggested that the mat-
ter might easily be arranged if 60
persons would agree to take \$10
worth of tickets each. This met with
the approval of the club and 15 or 20
signed up at the meeting. It was
pointed out that, as the opening day
of the Chautauqua would be July 4,
that the matter might advantageously
be handled in connection with the
proposed celebration. Among the
other attractions on the program is
Senator Burkett, of Nebraska, an or-
ator of national renown who, Ellison
stated, would be here on July 4.

Miscellaneous Matters.
A communication from the Albany
Commercial club suggesting the for-
mation of a district organization to
assist in promoting the interests of
the valley in connection with the
Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915,
was read but no action was taken.

A request from a Spokane newspa-
per for views of the city and litera-
ture regarding it to be placed on
file in Spokane, was referred to the
secretary.

Letter from the Oregon Develop-
ment league relative to an exhibit
from Polk county at the Eastern
land shows the coming fall, was read
and referred to County Superinten-
dent Seymour.

The secretary was instructed to for-
ward to the Pacific Good Roads as-
sociation which is to hold a good
roads meeting in Eureka, Cal., soon,
a list of the officers of the club.

Letter from Governor Cox, of
Ohio, thanking the city for its con-
tributions for the Ohio flood sufferers
was read and placed on file.

J. E. Miller, representing the Dal-
las, had asked what the position of
the club would be regarding the reg-
ular Saturday night concerts during
the summer. He was assured that
the club would heartily support the
plan and no doubt was expressed but
that the matter would be arranged
along former lines.

Davis and Horn and Herbert J.
Flagg were admitted as members of
