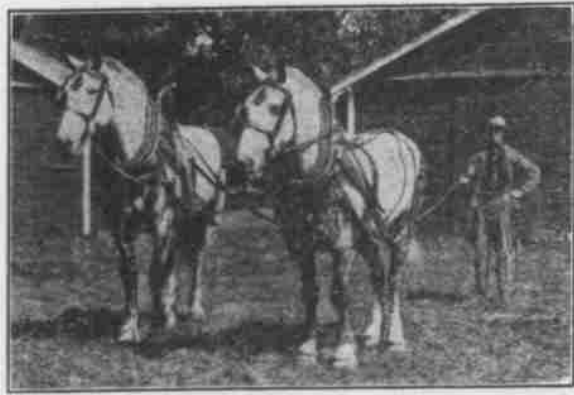

J. L. Murdock, of Portland, made Monmouth, his former home, a visit Saturday.

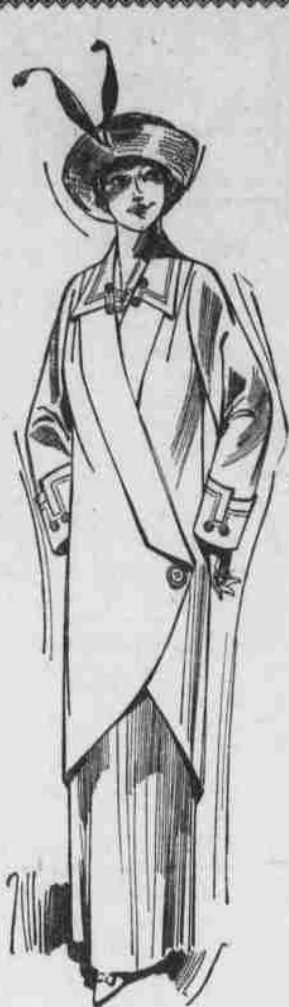

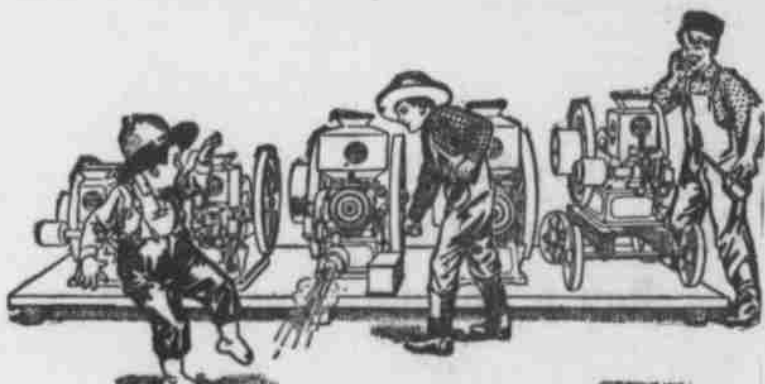
