DALLAS PEOPLE ARE POOLED

Warning Issued to Watch Out For O. & C. Land Locators.

A number of Dallas and Polk county residents who in the past have succumbed to the wiles of "locating agents" who have offered to locate them on choice sites of the O. & C. land grant for a consideration as soon as the government recovers that land will be interested in a statement which has been issued by Louis L. Sharp, chief of the field division of the general land office:

"These locating agents are taking it for granted," declares Mr. Sharp, "that the lands thus reverting to the government are to be thrown open for settlement at once. On this basis, therefore, they are advising prospective homesteaders to locate at once on desirable tracts of timber, becoming 'squatters,' and when the government does throw it open to entry, they will have acquired a right to their quarter section."

"These lands will not be thrown open for settlement under any homestead act that the United States has today. To dispose of them will require a special act of congress and it is likely that several years will pass before this is done. It is quite possible that they will be added to the territory of the national forests. For anyone to locate on these lands in any expectation of ever obtaining squatters' rights to them," declares Mr. Sharp, "will be the height of folly."

"The government is endeavoring to protect would-be settlers from negotiating with the locators at all. There is no way for the government to prosecute them for making criminal representations except when they use the mails. Mr. Sharp and others of the land department have found that this is a thing the locators rarely do."

Coast Gets Many Auto Trucks.

San Francisco, May 7.—That the automobile as a commercial vehicle has come to stay is evidenced by a special train of 26 cars loaded with 154 auto trucks now enroute from Chicago to the Pacific Coast. The trucks were shipped by the Lincoln Motor Works at Chicago on May 15, consigned to B. F. Taylor and Company of Los Angeles, and are due to reach California on May 23. They are valued at \$80,000.

Solid cars will be sent to San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle and Vancouver, B. C., from where they will be distributed throughout California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. They are routed via the Rock Island, El Paso and Southwestern and Southern Pacific lines.

This shipment is the largest ever made of purely commercial power driven machines. There have been carloads of auto trucks before and trains of pleasure automobiles, but this is the first train of its kind ever sent to the Coast. It is freely predicted that this movement and others of its kind to follow mean a general replacement of horse-drawn wagons and trucks throughout the West.

Later on a physician may be called in who may possibly apply caustics. Later on a surgeon may be seen who will advise cutting out the cancerous growth from the womb or cutting out the entire womb.

The caustic applications have the danger of all such remedies of irritating the cancer germs and cells and driving them into the lymphatic glands, thus starting new cancers. Aside of this the long continued pain, hours or days, is often unbearable. The cutting operations have the danger of inoculating the fresh cut surfaces with cancer germs and cells and in addition surgical shock

and loss of blood combined with the danger of blood poisoning hard to avoid in such a locality. Aside of this the woman is unsexed if the entire womb is removed.

Dr. Toel has for many years given up the use of the knife or scissors in cases of cancer of the womb for he soon found out that electricity gave him far better results.

Where there is a cauliflower growth this can be quickly removed with the low voltage current operation without the loss of a single drop of blood and with so little pain that the use of ether or chloroform is not necessary. In cancerous ulcerations these are destroyed with the very high voltage current, while when these extend into the vagina he uses a new method invented by himself with alternating medium voltage.

A great many patients have thus been cured that would have little show under caustics and knife operations.
