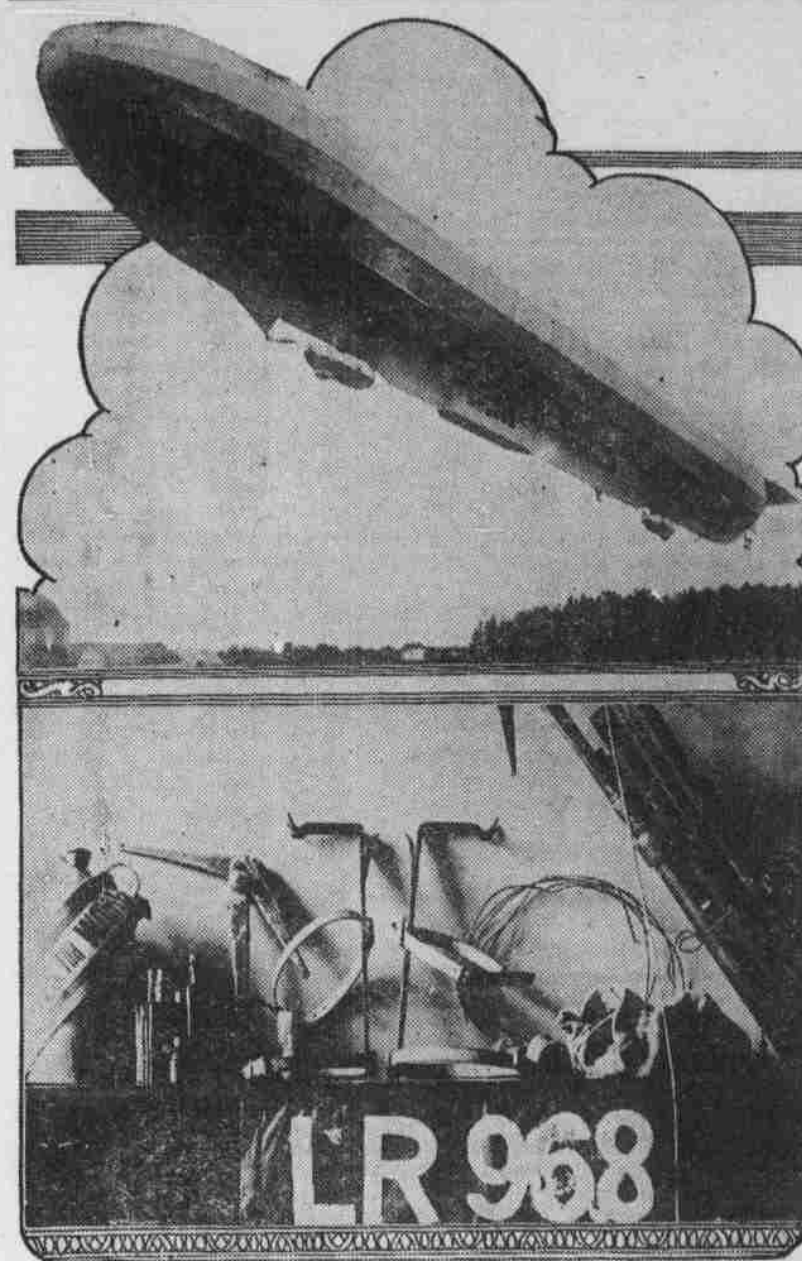
MAGICIAN FOR OPENING NIGHT

THESE interesting pictures tell their own story of two important news events abroad. The airship is the Zeppelin IV, the German army dirigible which stirred up a fuss by getting out of order and out of bounds. It came down at Luneville, France, near the German border, on the French military grounds, and war talk immediately broke out. This incident must have pleased the war manipulators in Germany if recent allegations are correct. The other illustration shows the suffragette arsenal captured by the London police. These are the implements of war which the "votes for women" agitators used in burning letters in the street mail boxes, cutting telegraph and telephone wires and in setting fires.

ADVERTISING.

Where is there a man today so dull of wit as to argue that advertising is not a paying investment? Poor advertising, like poor whiskey, will put a man "on the bum," so to speak. The head of nearly any large establishment in the country today could scarcely write a dozen lines for an advertisement that would bring returns for the investment. That fact has caused the demand for men who can tell the people of the advantages of the establishment. These men are called ad-writers, or ad-smiths. Sometimes they prepare advertising matter that is not for the newspapers. Sometimes it is for window cards, for circulars or for magazines—but in the end the newspapers always carry out the prime idea and this is taken into the homes and absorbed by the customer. I will beg the reader's pardon by citing a case at home. There is the Hayter book and stationery store, in a town of 2600 or more inhabitants. It is a model illustration of the possibilities of one who understands advertising as well as scientific salesmanship. Mr. Hayter learned the value of printer's ink while he washed it from his hands in the Observer office and sniffed the delightful richness of its aroma for some 18 years or more. When he started in a small way two years ago to make a book and stationery store in Dallas that is now equal of any in the state outside of Portland, some wise ones giggled. Mr. Hayter is now doing the giggling. Every school teacher in the county and a whole lot of them in Marion and Yamhill counties know Hayter and know the kind of goods that he handles. They are able to wait right up to the counter and call for the school supplies that are desired. These teachers have found out what he carries by the judicious handling of printer's ink. The school marm don't go to Hayter's because he is a good-looking bachelor—they are after the goods. Mr. Hayter says, himself, that he could never have made any headway in business without patronizing the printing office. What has been said of the patronage of the teachers of the county is also true of the other lines of trade built up by Mr. Hayter and which is constantly increasing. What one can do, so can another.
