### New Station Matters.

Mr. Campbell stated that his company was not yet ready to build a new station here owing to the electrification problem in which the road was now engaged. He called attention to the fact that work along this line of improvement was now under way and that it might be necessary to utilize an entirely different site for the station building when the electrification shall have been completed and that the company did not desire to go to any great expense in the permanent improvement of the present grounds until that time, although, he said the company was perfectly willing to make such additions or alterations to their present structure as would meet the temporary needs of the patrons of the road.
