TWENTY YEARS AGO IN DALLAS

Taken From the Files of The Observer, Dated Thursday, June 22, 1893.

The Observer contained a lengthy letter from its editor "C. C. D." who was visiting the World's Fair at Chicago.

J. C. Wagner was appointed night watch by the city council.

It was noted that Monmouth Water company was increasing the capacity of its plant.

Miss Nora Miser had been re-engaged to teach another term of school at Cochrane.

The Lincoln saw mill owned by E. Y. Chase was reported as having burned at 4 o'clock on Sunday morning.

The building and plant was a total loss and the cause of the fire was not determined.

Marriage licenses were issued during the week to J. H. Young and D. A. Graves, George A. Cruise and Maggie Sears, J. A. McTimmonds and Lettie Hedgopeth.

On June 18 a son was born to Mr. and Mrs. John Martin and on June 20 a son to Mr. and Mrs. John Guy.

John W. Eakin, of Cairo, Ill., was visiting his brother, Hort C. Eakin, in Dallas.

Editor Doughty after a trip through the New England states, made a trip through Canada returning to Chicago, where he spent several days and then went on to Kentucky and other Southern states.

Dr. Charles Hines discontinued the practice of his profession in Dallas and left for his home in Forest Grove where he said he would remain for a time before deciding on a future location.

Many people had been in attendance at the commencement exercises of the state Normal school at Monmouth and spoke very highly of the event.

DALLAS PASTOR IS HONORED

Rev. D. Lester Fields Gets Master of Arts Degree at Willamette.

In 1909 D. Lester Fields graduated from Willamette university with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. In 1910 from Kimball College of Theology with the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. On June 18th of this year he was given the degree of Master of Arts as the result of work done in history and sociology.

It means something to receive a degree from Willamette university with her \$500,000 property and \$500,000 endowment. R. A.
