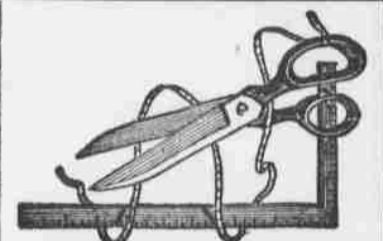

WANTS NEW STATION SITE

West Salem People Want Company To Move Depot.

West Salem citizens have entered a petition with the state railroad commission, asking that the Southern Pacific change the location of the two present depots to Johnson and Second streets. At present one depot is about 200 yards north of the west end of the Center street bridge. The other is at Kingwood park, about a mile southwest.

It is said that five-sixths of the traveling public of West Salem is within a radius of a block from Second and Johnson streets, the proposed location of the new depot. While the station is being constructed, the people ask that the railroad be instructed to have their trains stop at the designated location.
