MRS. LEE DIES IN PORTLAND

Former Resident of Dallas, and Well Known Here, Passes.

Mrs. J. D. Lee, a former resident of Dallas, died in Portland on Saturday, June 28, at the Portland Sanatorium following an operation, and was buried on Sunday from the Centenary Methodist church. Mrs. Lee, whose maiden name was Eliza Alice Witten was born in Tennessee in 1847 and came to Oregon with her parents in 1852. She was a graduate of Willamette university and in early womanhood taught school in Polk and Marion counties. She was married to J. D. Lee in 1872 and for 16 years they made their home in Dallas, where Mr. Lee was engaged in the hardware business. They moved from here to The Dalles and thence to Portland in 1892.

opinion of many present that Butler's argument for Independence failed to show any substantial reason why the fair should go to that city.

Following Butler's remarks, Attorney Hayter presented Dallas' side of the case and showed by convincing arguments and the submission of figures that this city was the only logical point for the location. He combatted Butler's contention regarding railroad facilities and showed where Dallas, located near the geographical center of the county, was entitled to the fair. His remarks contained many other cogent reasons favoring this city and evidently impressed the board for, following the submission of arguments, the spectators withdrew and, upon a vote being taken, Dallas received two votes to one for Independence as the location for the annual exhibition to be held this fall.

Is Logical Location.

Previous to this vote, Chairman Chas. A. Park, expressed the opinion that there was but one logical location for the count fair, and that was in the city of Dallas.

On motion of W. W. Percival, of Independence, the board went on record as protesting against asking the county court for any further assistance for the fair this year.

That the board acted in an eminently fair manner in settling this question is the sentiment of all parties. Ample time was given Independence, or any other section of the county to present its claims, and the board expressed itself as willing to hear arguments on all sides. No attempt at "snap judgment" can be charged against the board, and it is now hoped, and the people of Dallas and the Polk County Fair association have a right to expect, the united support of all sections of the county in making the coming exhibition a success.

of Oak street between Main and Jefferson street, signed by three of the five abutting property owners, was read and referred to the street committee to report at the next meeting on Monday night.

The city marshal was instructed to prevent, as far as possible, the throwing of rubbish on the new macadam base in the hard surface district.

The street commissioner was instructed to trim up Academy street with the road grader and get it in shape for the Fourth, and the Marshal was given the power to require property owners to trim up their shade trees and to mow their parking strips.

In the matter of the payment of street assessments made by property owners in the 1912 improvement districts, it was ordered that the amount so paid for the complete improvement which was unfinished last year, and which would not be completed this year, be refunded.

On motion of Councilman Hayter, it was ordered that the sum of \$2500 be transferred from the general fund to the 1913 street improvement fund No. 1.

Special Policemen Named.

On motion of Councilman Risser, the members of the sports committee of the celebration were appointed as special policemen for the Fourth and the Chautauqua to serve without pay. Other special policemen named were City Engineer H. J. Flagg to serve without additional compensation; W. J. White to be paid by the city and John Shaw and Milton Grant to be paid by private parties.

Petition from Adams & Martin to permit them to modify their rock hauling contract so as to escape the provisions of the new eight hour law was read, and a resolution modifying the contract was passed. This was in accordance with action taken at a previous meeting.

The matter of permitting persons to camp in the city park during the chautauqua session, and at other times, was left with the city park board.

often threatened to "get the old lady" referring to Mrs. Stewart, whom he blamed for his troubles, and for estranging the affections of his wife and causing her to leave him. When he was examined for his sanity before County Judge Ed. F. Coad in May, 1912, he constantly declared that he would "shoot the whole d—d outfit" at that effect, Sheriff Grant and Dr. Starbuck, the experienced physician at that time, experienced considerable trouble with Davis, as he put up a fierce fight and the three rolled and tumbled around the office before the sheriff finally managed to place the handcuffs on his wrists.

Still fighting, he was half-dragged to the county jail and later conveyed to the insane asylum.

Previous to his apprehension for insanity, he had been in Dallas for a few days displaying loaded revolvers and making threats it is said, in fact his actions at this time formed the principal reason for his arrest and following commitment.

Little Town is Stirred.

The tragedy has stirred the little town of Ballston to the depths and Monday the people stood around in groups discussing the killing and the events leading up to it. At the little home where the wife and mother lay in death's embrace, with a jagged bullet hole in her right cheek, everything was turned topsy-turvy and the kitchen bore ample evidence of the struggle with the murderer. On the floor in one corner was a great purple stain, mute evidence of the crime and although willing hands had made an effort to wipe out the cruel spot, it still remained telling in gruesome detail of how a mother had died.

On the kitchen door a hand-nosed bullet lightly imbedded in the wood, showed that it must have been spent when it struck the door and is probably one that passed through the body of

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
