looked after at this time, the exhibit should show the forage plants and the grains which are valuable. We may have a lot of stuff growing that has no particular commercial value, and it is advisable to leave such things out.

Arrangement of Samples.

We should now be gathering the grasses, and have at least two samples of each kind. The samples should be placed in bunches of not less than six inches at the butt. In making these, they should at first be tied up in smaller bunches, and hung with the tops down in a dark room that is dry and cool and where there is no danger of being bothered by rats or mice. This cures the grasses in such a manner that they will stay green. Hang these bunches when curing on the wall or ceiling. In selecting specimens for exhibit, get as long stems or straws as possible.

The grains in most instances are not quite ready to gather, but these should also be gathered in bundles of not less than six inches at the butt. Have the heads evenly arranged. The leaves of the grain should be stripped from the stock. Give attention to nice bright straw and of good length. We urge upon the farmers the necessity of giving these matters their immediate attention.

What Will the Suffragettes Do After They Stop Plying Torch?

EVERY day almost one reads of arsonette outrages in England. Only the other day the arson squad of the militant suffragettes burned down Ballikirk castle, in Scotland, a half a million 100 room mansion, unoccupied at the time. Before that they had burned down the grandstand at the Hurst park race track. The ruins of this fire are here pictured. Fighting for the vote by the firebrand seems to be the present status of the woman movement in England. Americans wonder when the "wild women" will take up the rifle. That seems to be the next logical step since they have previously tried the bomb.

VARICOSE VEINS.

Their Causes and Effects and the Treatment They Require.

A varicose vein is an enlarged and twisted vein, generally in the leg. It is caused by stagnation of the blood. Often the patient has a hereditary predisposition to varicose veins or he has a weak heart, with a consequent tendency to sluggish venous circulation.

Anything that interferes with the flow of blood through the veins may bring on an attack. Pressure from a tight garter and very severe muscular exertion are often exciting causes. Persons who are obliged to stand for several hours at a time, like policemen, washerwomen and saleswomen, are often subject to this trouble. Under ordinary conditions the blood in the legs or more run up hill constantly in order to regain the heart. In the case of those who stand most of the day the blood has to work hard hour after hour in order to overcome the force of gravity, and as a result the veins gradually enlarge and harden.

In mild cases of varicose veins, especially in young and otherwise healthy people, the symptoms are very slight. There is a feeling of weight in the leg and a dull ache toward the end of the day. The ache is soon relieved by the patient's resting with the leg somewhat raised so that the blood can flow back more easily. Sometimes painful cramps complicate the trouble, and the cramp is likely to return again and again until life becomes a burden.

More serious complications are thrombosis (or the clotting of the blood in the vein) and phlebitis (or inflammation of a vein). Often a form of ec-

zema appears in the skin of the leg, or an ulcer may arise. When varicose veins are very troublesome surgical treatment is advisable, but the milder cases can be much relieved by rest and proper bandaging.—Youth's Companion.

Varlet and Valet.

"We have only ourselves, or rather, our forefathers, to blame for the trouble about the pronunciation of 'valet,'"

says the London Chronicle. "If they had stuck to 'valet' there would have been no difficulty. 'Valet' and 'varlet' are the same word, meaning originally just a boy, the diminutive of 'vassal'.

Unluckily when our ancestors applied a servant to a boy to signify a servant they went on to make it bear a scornful sense. And so 'valet' degenerated hopelessly, just as did 'knaave,' which is simply the German 'knave' boy."
