During the last week two patients applied for help from their sufferings from cancer to Dr. Toel. If this patient had heard of Dr. Toel three months ago, his chances would have been far better. But unfortunately he had applied only to surgeons that use the knife alone, and who had not even mentioned to him that many cancers that are incurable with the knife, can be cured with electricity. As he lived in Eastern Oregon his chances of hearing of Dr. Toel of course were small.

In the other case that came to Dr. Toel last week it was different. The patient lives six miles from Dallas and it is inconceivable to Dr. Toel how his many articles in the Dallas papers about the electrical cure of cancer could have been overlooked. The patient suffered from an intra-abdominal cancer, and while such cases always give a poor prognosis, many have been cured by the X rays. In this case however the disease had so undermined the patient's general health, there being scarcely any blood

in circulation, that Dr. Toel could only say that there was very little hope. The patient was discouraged and left for home. Had this patient applied for help when Dr. Toel first came to Dallas nearly four months ago, the prospect for a cure would have been a far better one.

When metastases from a cancer on the outside of a body appear in internal organs the prognosis of course becomes very bad, though even such cases have been cured by X rays.

When however the patient waits until his entire vitality is gone, he can not expect anything even from electricity.

What is said here in regard to cancers refers also to a great extent to other forms of tumors. Do not wait until they become incurable, but go to a specialist as soon as you discover a tumor on or in your body.

Finis J. Garrett Heads House Lobby Investigating Committee



REPRESENTATIVE FINIS J. GARRETT of Tennessee was appointed chairman of the house lobby investigating committee. As such he faced an unusual situation, inasmuch as he was compelled to start over the same ground that had already been covered by the senate lobby investigating committee, of which Senator Lee S. Overman of North Carolina is chairman. The house committee was empowered to probe into lobby conditions of the present and past sessions of congress. Its scope was not to be limited at all, and the indications were that the inquiry might extend all through the summer and possibly fall. The house had been stung by the charges of corruption made by Martin M. Mulhall, former lobbyist for the National Association of Manufacturers.



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The reason why it is not advisable to throw any quantity of sawdust around fruit trees is that it contains an acid that tends to sour the soil.

Forty-two per cent of the folks who live in the United States make their home in the cities. It is little wonder, in view of this, that there is a back to the land movement.

Cleanliness in handling, in straining and in separating the milk is a factor that cannot be too carefully adhered to, for prevention is the main road to quality in all dairy work.

Scratches or cracked heels in horses may be largely prevented by keeping the stall floor clean and dry and may be cured by washing the affected parts, drying them and applying carbolic vaseline.

The man who takes a book or magazine along with him when he goes fishing undoubtedly shows a desire to make the most of his time, but he can hardly be called a simon pure follower of old Ike Walton.

The use of covered milk pails has been found to reduce the number of bacteria in milk in the ratio of twenty to one. This means cleaner milk, purer milk, and milk that will stand considerably longer before souring.

The most used as well as usually the most abused of the human members are the feet. Because they are "on the job" so many hours during the day they should be provided with as good fitting and comfortable footwear as it is possible to secure.

The Irish lady who offered as a plea in court in defending herself against the charge of selling milk that did not contain the required amount of butter fat that her cows got too much dew on the grass that they consumed early in the morning was admonished to let her cows sleep longer.

The Langshan, one of the more popular of the heavyweight sitting breeds, is a native of China, having been introduced into the United States in 1870 by a Major Crood. The standard weight for the cock bird is ten pounds, cockerel eight pounds, hen seven pounds and pullet six pounds.

The scattering of the spores from the red cedar blossoms or balls to the nearby apple trees may be materially checked by snipping these balls off before they get to the "ripe" or transmitting stage. Spraying experiments with dilute lime-sulphur show a control of the rust that is only 10 per cent effective.

The general idea of the Indian being the easy victim of the white man's trickery seems to be reversed in the case reported from British Columbia where a group of Indians staked what they claimed was a rich gold district and then proceeded to unload it on greedy American and Canadian gold seekers.

affirm, and this is the only kind of argument that cuts much figure with the average farmer, is that when a field of the legume is established with a good stand it will yield an annual return in alfalfa hay worth from forty to sixty dollars per acre, while other crops have to do well to bring a return of from fifteen to twenty dollars.

An excellent as well as rich fertilizer may be made by pouring a strong solution of lye over broken bones in a stone crock. The contents should be stirred frequently and left until the bones have been converted into jelly. A tablespoonful of this in a gallon of water makes a fertilizer that is as good as any prepared fertilizer and costs but about one-tenth as much.

It is one of the small mysteries of nature why potato bugs will be thicker than hair on a dog one season, as was the case a year ago, and even camping out o' nights on the ground waiting for the vines to show up, while the season following, as is the case this year, there are few, if any, to be seen. At any rate, it is fortunate for the potato grower that there is this irregularity.

The secretary of the Kansas State Horticultural society has lately received reports of the death of fruit trees in different sections following the application to the trunks of axle grease or petroleum grease to prevent worms and caterpillars from climbing up them and gnawing them.

The grease fills the pores of the bark and prevents the tree from getting air. He recommends in place of the grease sticky fly paper or a mixture of castor oil and resin applied on a band of cotton batting.

The twenty-seventh week of the International egg laying contest closed with Barron's pen of English White Leghorns still in the lead, with a score of 618 eggs. The next best record is held by Cam's pen of English White Leghorns, their performance being 550 eggs. Third place was held by Schmitz's pen of American White Leghorns, their score being 527 eggs. Cam's pen of English White Wyandottes held fourth place, with a score of 514 eggs, and Boster's pen of American White Leghorns stood fifth, with 505 eggs.

Owing to the unfavorable conditions which have existed in the apple market since last fall, the season has been a disappointing one, and this is true of many sections in the west where, in addition to the usual heavy expense incident to bringing the crop through the packing house, there has been a heavy expense growing out of transportation and cold storage charges. In some instances growers have had to dig up money to pay freight charges, the amount received for the fruit not being sufficient to meet this and the other necessary expenses.

If one does not wish to run the risk that is involved in the canning of corn it may be easily preserved by packing it down in salt. To do this all one needs to do is to pick, husk and silk the corn when it is at the proper stage, boil about fifteen minutes on the cob to set the milk and then slice off and mix it with salt at the rate of four parts of corn to one of salt. Pack in an earthenware jar and cover with plate and weight so that all of the corn will be under the brine. Before using the corn should be freshened for a period of fifteen or twenty hours.

INEXPENSIVE COOKBOOKS.
More than 12,000,000 copies of government bulletins treating of the preparation of food products for the table have been issued since this line of work was taken up by the federal department of agriculture. The largest number of any bulletin issued was that entitled "The Economic Use of Meat in the Home." Five hundred thousand copies of the bulletin on "Breadmaking" were issued, and 300,000 copies of the pamphlet on "Cheese-making" were printed. These are still available for distribution and may be had on request by writing the department of agriculture.

Competent veterinary authorities state that good, clean hog cholera serum will usually retain its potency for a year if kept sealed and in a cool, dark place. On the other hand, if the bottle has been opened and the contents exposed to the air it is likely to be contaminated and spoiled for further use.

The United States public health service at Washington, D. C., has lately prepared a bulletin on the subject of constructing rat-proof buildings and outbuildings. It also tells how to make old buildings ratproof. The bulletin may be had by writing for it to the health department at Washington.

The horse sorrel which has an arrow shaped leaf and a reddish blossom spike is a pest in a good many localities and is likely to be especially troublesome on thin and sour soils. Thorough cultivation will kill it, but what is needed along with this is a manuring of the soil to tone it up and lime to sweeten it.

The other day, near Carbondale, Ill., when the debris was being cleared away from the site of a small farmhouse that had been razed by a severe windstorm which passed over the section forty-seven days before, a live hen turkey was found that had been imprisoned at the time of the storm and had had neither food nor water during the interval mentioned.

Professor Hoecker of Minnesota is authority for the statement that the annual value of the dairy products of the state has increased from \$7,800,000 to \$50,700,000 in the past twenty-three years. And it might be added that along with this increase in the dairy business has come a large measure of prosperity for the farmers who have had a hand in its growth.
