Mrs. Ed. Wunder, of Independence, Oregon, formerly of Monmouth, came to Dallas on August 5 to consult Dr. Toel on account of a tumor in her right breast.

Women who notice a lump in their breasts should never neglect this. It is far easier on them to have the growth removed before it becomes cancerous, than to wait until a cancer has formed and then undergo an operation.

While Dr. Toel's electrical operations are free from the danger of knife operations, and while returns of the cancer after his electrical operations are far rarer than after knife operations, yet it is easier on the patient to have the tumor removed by electrical treatments, than to wait until it has become cancerous and makes an electrical operation necessary. In addition it is cheaper too.

What is said here in regard to tumors of the breast holds good also for many uterine tumors as well as tumors in other parts of the body.

Have them removed before they become cancerous.

Dr. Toel can be found for some time yet at his office at 619 Washington street, Dallas, Oregon, one-half block east of the S. P. R. R. depot.

Do not wait until he has left Dallas for some other county seat to introduce his electric methods.
